## Independence Fire Apparatus Will Cost \$4000

Independence, Or., April 21.—At a recent meeting of the city council an ordinance was adopted intended to bond the city for \$4000 with which to purchase a hose cart and chemical engine, and such other fire fighting equipment that may be required. The city has had a fire engine and truck on trial for several days and it is likely that this or one of its equal will be purchased.

Another ordinance requiring the construction of a cement sidewalk in front of the property owned by Mrs. Harriet R. Brunk on Fourth street was adopted, and a resolution was passed declaring the intention of the city council to pave the alley between First and Second streets from B to Monmouth streets.

## Roseburg Council To Enlarge Auto Camping Grounds

Roseburg, April 21.—That the council will enlarge the camp grounds by securing a portion of the land in the rear of the Winberly home, rather than taking the Cardwell property, was the sentiment expressed at the meeting. Mr. Cardwell recently closed up his half of the camp ground, claiming that the lease granted to the Merchants' association was not transferable to the city. That lease called for the payment of \$25 on the first of each April, and the amount was not paid this year, so Mr. Cardwell immediately fenced off his property and now demands the payment of \$150 per year. It was the sentiment of the council that Mr. Cardwell has the city "over a barrel," but the city does not propose to pay the sum demanded if it can help. Several of the councilmen expressed a willingness to pay that much for the Winberly property but will not pay the sum for the Cardwell lot unless forced to it. Councilmen Barker, Powell and Seely were appointed as a committee to meet at once and settle the camp ground controversy, being given power to act for the council.

## Institute Preferred To Summer School; Oregon City Teachers

Oregon City, April 21.—As it has been customary during the past few years to hold a three weeks' summer school in Oregon City when teachers of various sections of the county attend, a vote was canvassed as to whether the summer school would be continued or to go back to the former three days' institute, to be held in the fall, after the commencement of school. The county school supervisor found that the majority of the teachers prefer the three days' institute, and the result of the vote taken resulted, 223 voting for the institute and 24 for the three weeks' summer school. The decision was announced by the district boundary board Monday.

The institute will be held next fall and enables county teachers to enjoy a vacation without being compelled to come to this city to take up studies during the hot weather.

## Normal to Honor Mann's Birthday

Monmouth, Or., April 21.—Plans are being made at the normal to carry out Superintendent Churchill's suggestion of observing May 4, the 125th anniversary of the birth of Horace Mann. A program will be given and this great educator's memory and work will be fittingly honored.

## Salem Speed Is Albany Goal In Building Work

Albany, Or., April 21.—George Richardson, Albany building contractor, thinks that Albany should keep pace with Salem and Portland in building this spring. At the present time Salem and Portland have building booms in progress, Mr. Richardson says.

Mr. Richardson is finishing a new house for himself and has the Pugh home well along. He also is doing some work for Ross Douglas, who is ready to build on Salem road just past the city limits. Mr. Douglas has the basement for his house excavated and will begin construction as soon as the weather permits. He will build a story and a half bungalow.

## Chimney Fire Destroys Home

West Port, Or., April 21.—A fire starting from sparks from the chimney at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Sheldon of this place, completely destroyed the dwelling, despite the efforts of the owners and neighbors to save it. Only a mass of charred debris remains.

Mr. Sheldon, who is stable foreman for the Westport Lumber company, was cooking his dinner at the time the fire started and when he discovered the flames had made considerable headway. All efforts to quench the fire were unavailing. Some of the more valuable furnishings of the dwelling were saved though Mr. and Mrs. Sheldon lost practically everything.

## Post Road Matter To Be Discussed

Oregon City, April 21.—To decide on the proposition of the Wilsonville-Portland post road, a meeting of officials from Clackamas, Yamhill and Multnomah counties, supplemented by interested citizens from the districts affected, will be held at the commercial club in conjunction with the Live Wire luncheon. A delegation from Wilsonville will be present to urge the change to a post road for the route, and they will be backed by the Wires who have endorsed the plan.

It is understood that if the Wilsonville people are granted the right to make a post road they will withdraw their objection to the hard surface bond issue in the county. Otherwise a special election will probably be called to allow the diversion of the bond issue money from strictly road surface to macadam or gravel roads.

## Thirteen Hundred Acres Controlled By Mint Compy

Eugene, Ore., April 21.—Thirteen hundred acres of marsh land are under the control of the Pacific Coast Mint company at Klamath Falls, according to L. J. Frank, who arrived in town with Mrs. Frank from the southern town on business for the company.

A car load of mint plants will be loaded here under the direction of Mr. Frank to be shipped north and also, if completed in time, a distillery which is under construction by Hall and Shumway. The company distills its own peppermint oil on the ground according to Frank.
