

Reds Plan Terrors For May 1

Paris Communist Organ Wants Unemployed to March On Gilded Dance Palace

Paris, April 21.—The annual campaign to create a reign of terror in Paris on May day has just been launched by French communist leaders.

The first shot is an article in the communist organ, *L'Humanite*, inviting "120,000 unemployed of Paris to march on the gilded dance palaces of Montmartre as a demonstration against the reckless expenditure of money by Americans, South Americans, English and French 'newly rich.'" This article, it is understood, will shortly be followed by others with the object of stirring up the unemployed to a great manifestation on the first day of May.

"We cannot better symbolize the scandalous state of present-day morals than to point out to the 120,000 unemployed in Paris the character and costly diversions of the clientele of the Montmartre establishments where a small minority spend their nights," begins *L'Humanite*. "With the official complicity of the police, a band of profiteers are exploiting the newly rich and the foreigners under every possible form."

Complain of Prices.
"Since the armistice, and even during the last six months these night 'joins' have continued to multiply. An entire section of Paris (Montmartre) is infested with them. They serve champagne suppers at outrageous prices. Some of them are full until daybreak despite solemn police regulations that provide for their closing at 2 a. m. And the only answer the police give is this: 'Well, we can't all be bishops.'"

"The personnel of these places include, in addition to the waiters, who merchants and professional dancers, a horde of young and old women, more or less undressed, for the benefit of the clients, some musicians and a few 'detectives.' The clients spend fortunes every night. One night all the unemployed of Paris should march on the Place Pigalle (center of Montmartre) to show these reckless spenders their misery."

The police have taken no extra precautions as a result of the communist appeal. Most of the Montmartre night establishments lie along narrow streets, converging on the Place Pigalle, or intersecting the Rue Pigalle. Previous experience in May day rioting, especially around the Place de la Republique, has taught the French police that such a section can easily be defended against mobs.

The Paris Federation of Labor has announced that it will observe May day on May 1, though that day is Sunday this year. The communist leaders are proposing to continue demonstrations the following day.

Prospective Grooms Display Large Rolls Unless They're Vets

San Francisco, April 22.—Officials of the San Francisco license bureau say that because prospective bridegrooms endeavor to display money in large rolls, their office is called upon to change more money daily than any other county office except that of the treasurer. A small boy is kept busy by the bureau getting \$10, \$20 and \$50 bills changed.

"This is the greatest place in the world for a man to put up a 'front,'" Grant Munson, deputy county clerk, in charge of the bureau, said recently. "Men, young, middle-aged and old come here with their prospective brides and take out marriage licenses. They know the license is \$2 but they

come with about all the money they can lay their hands on, done up in a roll.

"They change the money before they come into the bureau, so they can get and then come out here and make a flash before their brides-to-be."

"Of course some men do not do this. The really successful business man usually pays in silver. It is not unusual for a wealthy man, particularly if it is his second or third marriage, to show no bills at all but to ask the bride if she has any change."

"Men who have been married before generally show the wisdom of never showing too much money."

Annual Meet Of Linn's Pioneers to be June 22

Brownsville, Or., April 21.—Linn county pioneers and sons and daughters of pioneers will gather for their annual meet at Brownsville this year in the city park, June 22, 23, 24. This was decreed by the officers of the association at a meeting held here Monday afternoon. This will conflict neither with the meeting of the Oregon pioneers at Portland June 16, nor with the Brownsville chaletauqua held during the last of May and the first of June. It is understood by the association that the dates for the Lebanon strawberry fair have not as yet been chosen.

Committees for forwarding the work of preparation for Brownsville's big welcome to Linn county pioneers and their children were appointed as follows: Committee for obtaining speakers, President A. M. Thompson; for instrumental music, Wayne Standard; for vocal music, one from each of Brownsville's four churches; for exhibits, the Brownsville chamber of commerce; for decoration of the city and park, George Drinkard; for concessions of amusements, board of directors; for sports, W. C. Elmore.

Large Drainage Project Planned By Scio Bureau

Scio, Or., April 21.—The Scio farm bureau will undertake a drainage project this year of a larger magnitude than any other community in the county has undertaken, according to A. C. Heyman, Linn county agent.

The drainage project planned by the bureau is to take in 2500 acres owned by about 50 men, some of the land being farms and some small tracts. The proposed district lies southwest of Scio. The district is to be drained by an open ditch two miles long carrying the water into Thomas creek and underground laterals reaching each tract of land.

Brownsville Is To Get Five Miles of Road Improvement

Brownsville, Or., April 21.—The road committee appointed by the Brownsville chamber of commerce, consisting of Charles Sterling, Harry Thompson, Joseph Hume, Ed Standard and Charles Carlson has obtained from the county court the promise of five miles of market road.

The court was asked to turn what is known as the seven mile lane between Albany and Brownsville into a market road, but it seems that all of this work cannot be done at present on account of lack of funds. The court, however, decided to grade two and one-half miles of road in the Ash Swale sector and put crushed rock thereon. This will give the farmers in that section a good road into Brownsville right away.

The court agreed to grade and put crushed rock on another two and one-half mile section at the other end of the seven mile lane. This to give the farmers a good road on the way to Albany. That portion of roadway between the grades which will be completed immediately will be finished next year if the court finds market road funds available.

Skull Crushed By Falling Tree

Oregon City, Ore., April 21.—David Lindgren, a woodcutter on the Matt Glover place in the Eagle Creek county, was instantly killed Monday morning about 10:30 o'clock when a tree which he was cutting crashed to the ground, striking Lindgren on the head and crushing his skull. Lindgren and his brother, both bachelors, who made their home on the Glover place, had a contract for cutting wood and were completing the cut when the accident occurred.

The dead man came to this country from Sweden in 1871, and had lived in Clackamas county for the past 13 years. He leaves his brother Charles Lindgren. The body was brought to the parlors of Holman & Pace, this city, and later taken to Portland in charge of the Foresters lodge, which organization deceased was a member. The remains will be interred in the Rose City cemetery, Portland, Wednesday afternoon. He was 67 years of age.

Street Relocated.
Independence, Or., April 21.—The relocation of a portion of Main street in There's addition was ordered by the city council at a recent meeting. The location of the street was changed when the paving was done some time ago and the old location is not used and is unnecessary. It was deemed advisable to have that portion of the street vacated.

Polk County Court

Circuit Court.
Clara M. Edwards vs. Polk county, state of Oregon. Demurrer filed by District Attorney J. N. Hel ed stating that the court has no jurisdiction of the person of the defendant or the subject of the action. That the plaintiff has no legal capacity to sue; that there is a defect of parties plaintiff; that several causes of action have been improperly united; that the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute cause of action; and that the action has not been commenced within the time limited by the code of Oregon.
