

Cudahy Suicide Due To Diverse Reasons Claim

Los Angeles, Cal., April 21.—Funeral arrangements for John P. (Jack) Cudahy, son of the late Michael Cudahy, internationally known meat packer, and himself for a time manager of the Cudahy Packing company of Kansas City, who committed suicide here yesterday, were expected to be perfected today.

Cudahy's taking of his own life, according to detectives who investigated the tragedy, followed failure to negotiate a loan of \$10,000 from a Chicago bank.

Wife Hears Shot.
Yesterday, it was declared, Cudahy seemed his usual self. About 10:30 he was said to have gone to his room in the house in the Hollywood district of Los Angeles, where he and his family made their home.

Early in the afternoon Mrs. Cudahy heard a shot and hurried to her husband's room.

She found him dead, his head shattered from a gunshot wound. He lay on a bed, a shotgun close by. The shoe and sock had been removed from one foot, and the detective later decided he had placed the muzzle of the weapon in his mouth and pulled the trigger with his toes.

Court Suits Many.
In connection with the financial and physical troubles which were believed by officials and friends alike to have been the immediate cause of the suicide, a number of court actions in which Cudahy figured were recalled today.

Shortly after the Cudahys left Kansas City and arrived in Pasadena in 1914, Cudahy was sued for \$30,000 damages by Dr. B. O. Conner of Pasadena, who charged him with having violently thrown the physician's wife against a table.

In January, 1919, Cudahy was sued by a hotel company of Pasadena for \$451 said to represent a two years' hotel bill. In connection with this action Cudahy asserted he had loaned the president of the company \$30,000.

Once Tried Poison.
For several weeks prior to March 21 of this year Cudahy was at a Pasadena hotel, and according to a neurologist, then he came to a hotel in Los Angeles and registered under an assumed name. It was said. On April 15, back again at his Hollywood home, according to Dr. L. J. Huff, who attended him, he took poison. Dr. Huff found Cudahy ill but apparently his system was free from poison, the physician said. Cudahy told Dr. Huff, the latter stated to the police, he had tried to kill himself but declined to give reasons.

Why Cudahy lived at a hotel under a name other than his own, was not known. Friends today suggested it might have been in line with a complaint he once made that he "never could do anything like other men."

Notoriety Disliked.
"If I tip a waiter," he quoted him, "it is immediately circulated I am giving away \$100 bills."
"If I buy a piece of jewelry it is heralded from coast to coast."
"If I am seen at a race track I am always 'betting wildly.'"

In 1915 he disappeared for a time. Friends and relatives conducted a search which ended when he was found calmly reading a magazine in his Pasadena home. No explanation was ever made however.

In 1917 Cudahy caused a sensation through an argument with Prince Paul Troubetzkoy, when the latter, a vegetarian, made some remarks on meat eating that made Cudahy "sore" as he said when a physical encounter had been averted.

Served as Captain.
When the United States entered the war Cudahy obtained a captain's commission and was assigned to duty at Camp Lewis, Wash. He served six months and then, because of physical ailments, lost his commission.

Last June he assisted in the organization here of a motion picture producing company in which his children, Anne and Michael, were given juvenile roles in the first and only picture made by the organization.

Stockmen Seek Reserve Funds As Farm Loans

Chicago, April 21.—Legislation directing the secretary of the treasury to turn over \$100,000,000 of the profits of the federal reserve bank to federal land banks, and to be loaned by the latter institutions on stock cattle for the purpose of assisting cattle producers, has been recommended by W. P. G. Harding, governor of the federal reserve board, according to a statement today by Everett C. Brown, president of the National Livestock Exchange.

Enaction of such legislation, in the opinion of Mr. Brown, would enable a multitude of livestock men, "who might otherwise have been forced out of the business," to continue production. "Consumers also should receive a benefit from the increase in production thus made possible," the statement declared.

\$51 Forfeited By Two Chinese Taken In Raid

Jim Lea and Hee Him, two Salem Chinamen who were placed under arrest during the raid staged here last Saturday night, are \$51 poorer today than they were yesterday.

Jim Lea and Hee Him were arrested by Chief of Police Moffitt when anti-saloon officials, working with the local police, swooped down on several local establishments Saturday evening. Lea was charged with having intoxicating liquor in his possession, and Him was accused of possessing an opium outfit.

Yesterday afternoon when Lea and Him failed to appear before Police Judge Earl Race at 2 o'clock they forfeited the bond

Suzzalo to Give Commencement Talk At O.A.C.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, April 21.—Dr. Henry Suzzalo, president of the University of Washington, will give the address in connection with the fifty-second annual commencement of the Oregon Agricultural college, Monday morning, June 14, at 10 o'clock. Dr. Stephen B. L. Penrose, president of Whitman college, Walla Walla, Wash., will give the baccalaureate sermon Sunday, June 12 at 11 o'clock.

Commencement exercises will start Saturday June 11—alumni day and graduating class day. The alumni are planning to return to the college in large numbers. Reunions of several classes will be held—1916, 1911, 1906, 1901, 1896, 1891, 1885, and 1881. The senior class will hold its class day exercises and join with the alumni in certain of the alumni festivities on this day.

The largest graduation in the history of the college is indicated by the fact that considerable more than 300 students are candidates for graduation. Presentation of honor students and diplomas will be a feature of the graduation exercises. Mrs. William E. Metzger of Portland, soprano, will be special vocalist for the occasion.

The printed program will include lists of the Clara H. Waldo, A. J. Johnson, and Joseph H. Albert scholarship awards, together with lists of members in the various honor organizations of the college.

The lists of candidates for graduation includes 53 students in agriculture, 71 in home economics, 58 in various phases of engineering and 51 in commerce. Five students who are candidates for the degree of master of science are Willard J. Chamberlain, Corvallis; Edward R. Ding, Portland; Frank J. Rindold, Corvallis; Homer B. Morris, Yamhill; Katherine Waite, Elsonville, and James O. Foley, Corvallis.

Nearly 50 Portland men and women have been listed among the graduates.

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Yank On Trial In Ireland On Murder Charge

Belfast, April 21.—William Conlon, said to be a resident of the state of New Jersey, was placed on trial today before a military court, with two other men, charged with the murder of William McDowell on September 3 last. The murder occurred during an attack on a motor car driven by McDowell, in which

William McDowell, cashier of a linen thread corporation's factories, was carrying 1,200 pounds sterling to pay wages. The judge advocate said that Conlon was charged with the crime under the restoration of order in Ireland act, and the fact of his American citizenship did not prevent his being tried.
