## Bundle Day Announced As May 25

Bundle Day for Near East relief is being managed in Salem by Mrs. W. C. Kantner, who has announced Wednesday, May 25, as the day when clothes and other articles will be gathered in and later will be sent on a relief ship which will sail for the Near East. The clothes will be sent to Portland headquarters and will be shipped from that point.

This is the second year that the Bundle Day work has been carried on in Salem, by Mrs. Kantner, who because of the great success of the work last year, was chosen to do it again this year. The letter which Mrs. Kantner is sending out to communities near Salem is the following and explains the purpose of the drive: "Again the call of suffering humanity comes to generous hearts of America, asking for garments to clothe her poverty stricken, unsheltered people.

The response a year ago was splendid, but garments wear out and conditions have not improved as they should, and so the appeal for help again becomes an absolute compelling necessity. Bundle Day, May 25, has been set apart as 'Bundle Day,' at which the clothing is to be gathered up and, if convenient, sent to J. J. Handaker, Stock Exchange, Portland, Oregon, or otherwise to Kaffury Brothers, Salem, who have consented to take charge of the shipment here.

"I am asking you in the name of the suffering people and in the name of the God of Mercy to assume the direction of the campaign in your community, or to secure some one who will. In connection with the clothing campaign, it has been suggested that toys, dolls of any description, or any other small article that would serve to brighten a child's life would be very acceptable."
