Settlers Come To Oregon

300 Nebraska People Start West July 19; Entire State Makes Ready for Them

To comply with the request of the state chamber of commerce for the strictest co-operation in gaining satisfactory investments for the trainload of about 300 settlers which will leave Omaha, Nebraska, for the northwest on July 19, the committee to investigate the matter appointed by L. G. Hayford, president of the Marion County realtors association, to whom the request was turned over and read at a recent meeting of the organization, announced today that it would recommend exclusive listings with appraised valuations as the policy to be adopted by the realtors in this one case in particular, if not to be effective always.

This is in accord with the first of the instructions received from the state chamber to commercial organizations which asks that "listings be obtained of lands for sale in the district at prices based upon careful and equitable appraisal."

To Back Abnaisal.
The plan of the committee is to have all property listed, appraised by the board and to stand behind that appraisal as well as the man who sells the property. In the committee's opinion the exclusive listing policy will be necessary in this case to avoid conflict, for all property sold will be handled through the state chamber of commerce which is to be furnished with lists from all localities. From the chamber of commerce the lists will be passed on to the settler who will then choose what property he wishes to see in any of the districts of the state.

Other Towns at Work.
Following the second instruction from the state chamber "to form a corporation or financing commission composed of leading business men of the community for the purpose of buying up land or obtaining options on them, under terms that will permit the settler to make good, so the price will not be advanced to prospective purchasers, Eugene, according to advice received by the Salem Commercial club, has effected a tentative organization, the purpose of which is to buy or obtain options on land available for the settler, and to resell these lands on easy terms and long payments. In Crook county a chamber of commerce has been formed and is already at work preparing for the home seekers, while the Baker Chamber of Commerce has a committee working on plans for taking care of them when they arrive there.

Twenty-one Days in Oregon.
It has been recommended by the committee of the state chamber of commerce in Omaha conferring the Union Pacific officials, that representatives from different sections of the state be sent there in order that the condition surrounding the different sections might be better explained to the prospective settler. It was also recommended that the representatives leave Oregon by automobile thus giving them the use of the machine in interesting a prospect. No action has been taken on this matter by any Salem body.

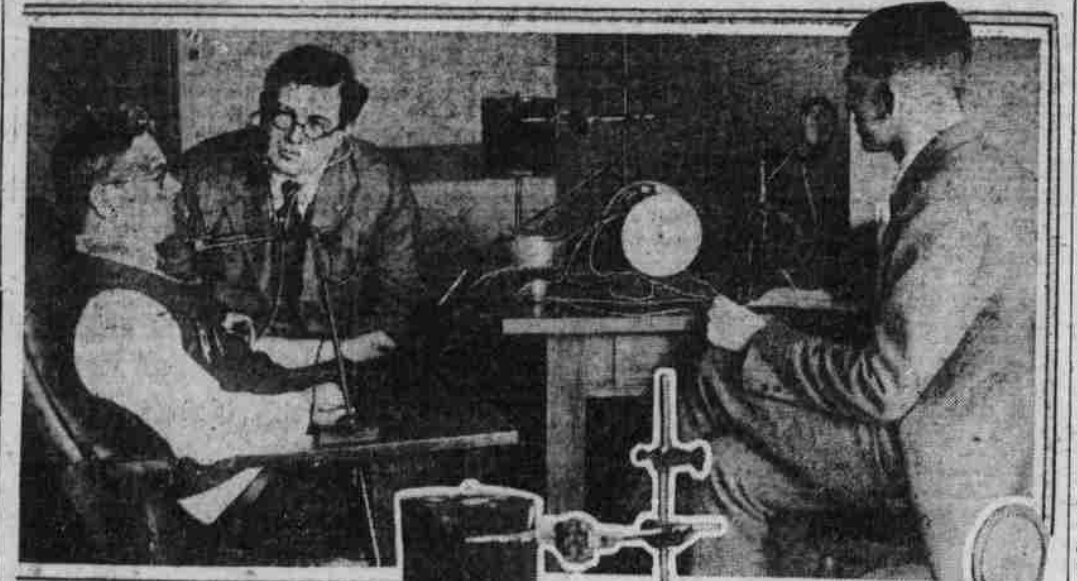
Four Companies Are Incorporated

Organized for the purpose of building and operating electric light and power plants, cold storage plants, the handling of dairy products and manufactured goods and the preserving of fruits, vegetables and seafoods, the Tillamook Consolidated Industries, Inc., of Wheeler, Tillamook county, filed articles of incorporation with the state corporation department here Wednesday. The company is capitalized at \$100,000 with the following incorporators: H. E. Rinehart, J. E. Bradley and James Smith.

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Portland And Astoria Forge To Front Fast

The growing importance of Portland and Astoria as grain exporting centers is indicated by figures on file in the office of the public service commission here which show that during the month of April, last, a total of 166,159 tons of grain, principally wheat, were inspected for export whereas during the same month a year ago no export cargoes were inspected by the department.

During the month the department inspected a total of 175,447 tons of grain at Columbia river ports—incoming and outgoing, as compared to a total of only 29,085 tons inspected during the same month a year ago.

The report shows a total of 163,051 tons of incoming wheat inspected last month as compared to only 26,667 tons in April, 1920. Oats received for inspection last month totaled 2310 tons as compared to 1804 tons a year ago. Corn totaled 752 tons as against 418 tons a year ago. Barley totaled 688 tons as compared to 196 tons a year ago. A total of 147 tons of rye and 2340 tons of miscellaneous grains were also handled by the department this year.

In spite of the radical increases in grain inspections for this year over a year ago members of the commission here predict even greater increases in grain shipments through Columbia river ports during the next year based upon the advantage gained thru the grain rate differential to the Columbia river basin points, together with the fact that the Washington department is faced with the necessity for increasing its inspection fees in order to maintain the department.

Hammond Mill In Astoria Will Resume Operations Monday

Astoria, Ore., May 21.—The Hammond Lumber company's big mill which has been closed down since last Saturday night to make repairs to the main trimmer, will resume operations today or Monday. As a result of the marine strike and the dullness of the lumber market the mills at Westport, Prescott and St. Helens will close down this week for an indefinite period.

The logging camps at Deer Island and the Westport logging camp also cease operations. The coast lumbermen claim they are handicapped in competing in the middle western markets by the high freight rates and also because they operate their mills an 8 hour day and the ruling wage is 45 cents an hour while the southern pine manufacturers their principal competitors, operate on a 10 hour day and their wage scale is from 17 1/2 to 20 cents an hour.

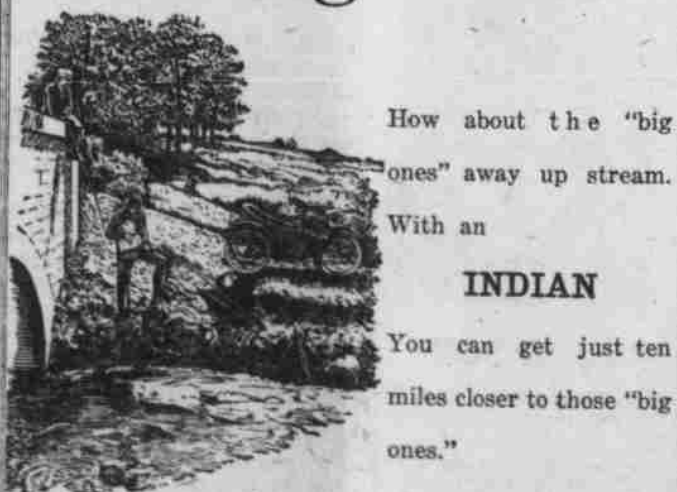
