## Bandits Hold Up Train and Steal Freight, Report

Buffalo, N. Y., May 21.—Twenty men, masked and armed, held up a freight train on the Sanborn branch of the New York Central railroad near North Tonawanda early today and carried away silks, shoes, clothing, automobile tires and other freight estimated to be worth \$70,000.

The train was held for half an hour, half the bandits covering the crew and railroad detectives with weapons, while the others loaded the goods into six motor trucks. The bandits headed for Buffalo with their loot.

Silverton, Or., May 21.—While bringing her baby to the hospital from the Silver Falls logging camps for treatment the railroad speeder upon which Mrs. R. H. Young and baby were riding jumped the track a short distance out of town and Mrs. Young sustained a fractured rib. The baby escaped with minor bruises. Victor Matheson, who was driving the speeder, sustained a broken leg. The speeder turned completely over and landed about ten feet from the track. Mrs. Young and child have returned to the camp while Mr. Matheson is still confined to the hospital.

## Gasoline Sales Big

A total of 2,419,331 gallons of gasoline and 1933 gallons of distillate were sold by the Standard Oil company in Oregon during April according to a statement received by the secretary of state's office Friday, accompanied by a check for \$48,416.52 to cover the state tax on motor fuel oil sales. The statement of the Shell Oil company for April shows sales of 200,143 gallons of gasoline and 423 gallons of distillate on which the state tax amounted to \$4009.55.
