Left-Overs Should Be Conserved

By Jessie Wetzel Knott. We must religiously save all left-overs, if we are to get the most out of the money we spend for food. Bones that are left can be made into excellent soup. There are many ways to use up cold meat, even if all that is left is unattractive scraps. Save the water in which vegetables are boiled, except potato water and bean water. Rice water makes an excellent meatless tomato soup, and cabbage water makes good soup Crecy.

This month lamb and veal are cheaper and more plentiful. Celery is still good, and new cabbage is in the markets in sufficient quantity to be fairly cheap. There are new string beans, peas, eggplant, radishes, cauliflower, so clean and white that it is a joy to cook it, a condition that does not always obtain.

Salad Greens. Mushrooms are fresh and good. Onions are coming in from the south, and there are hot-house cucumbers and tomatoes. The best salad greens for the month are endive, cress, dandelions and chives. Oranges and lemons are plentiful. The grapefruit season is about over. Haven't they been excellent this winter?

In fish there are shad, salmon, trout, whitefish, smelts and fresh mackerel, all in prime condition. Is there any better fish than fresh mackerel, I wonder? I very much doubt it. In the few weeks in the spring when it is in season we should make the most of it. Lobsters, clams, green turtle and crab are fine this month. By the way, if you are making orange marmalade, try this recipe for orange preserves, which I have followed with success. It makes a clear preserve:

Take equal weights of sour oranges and sugar. Peel two oranges in every six and soak these rinds for 24 hours in salt water. Wash and shiner until tender, changing the water twice. Drain and cut with scissors into thin strips. Cut the oranges into halves at the "equator." Take out pulp from seeds. Drain, add sugar, stir until boiling, skia and simmer fifteen minutes, add pulp and rind strips and simmer 20 minutes longer.

This was the assertion of a prominent maker of wax mannequins to our representative recently, and an examination of a dozen mannequins dressed in London's smartest gowns proved its truth. The beautiful silent fashion pioneers all wore gowns that flared slightly across the hips and showed a distinctly wider waistline than that of last season.
