French Champagne Exports Increasing; Yankees Are Buyers

Washington, May 28. — "Dry" laws have not stopped the demand for sparkling French champagne.

Boat loads of that rare old luxury are now being used by Americans. This fact is shown by French government figures disclosing large increases in shipments of champagne to the United States.

French champagne exported to American buyers last year, the first twelve months of national prohibition, amounted to \$384,000.

In the preceding year, before the Volstead law went into effect,

coming into American ports under special permits issued to importers authorized by the government to handle such liquors for "medicinal" or other uses enumerated under the dry permits.

Radicals Seize Mexican Town Kill Officials

Mexico City, May 27.—Radical elements seized the municipal government of the village of Jacana, near Zamora, state of Michoacan yesterday, and in fighting with the village authorities killed the chief of police and wounded the mayor and several other civilians. Red flags were hoisted above several buildings but when the radicals attempted to force their way into churches, the populace resisted so strongly that the disturbers withdrew.

The people of Zamora, hearing of the outbreak took up arms and rushed to the aid of the authorities of Jacana, but before fighting began federal forces intervened.

Less serious demonstrations were held by radicals yesterday afternoon Urusapan, about 35 miles southeast of Zamora. There

was some fighting, but no casualties.

dairy products and preserve fruits, vegetables and sea foods.

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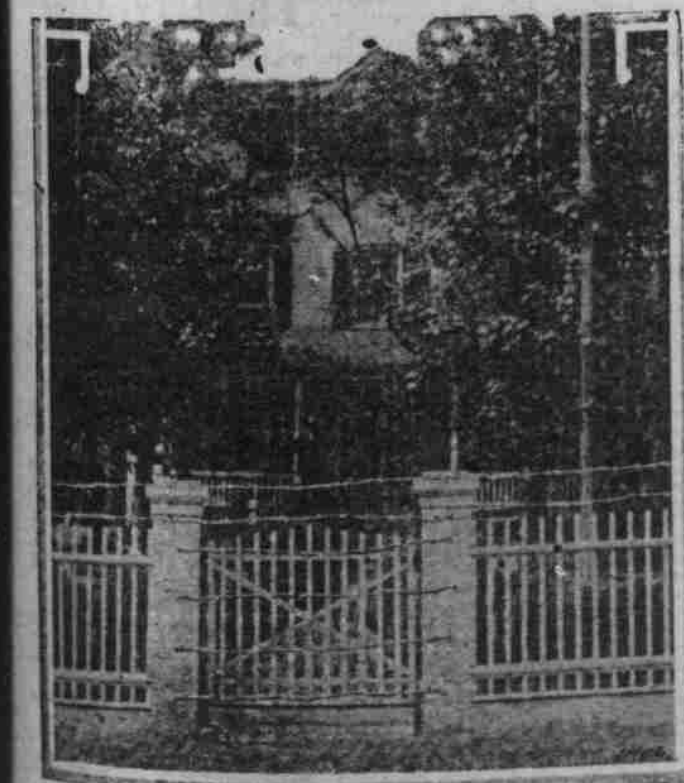
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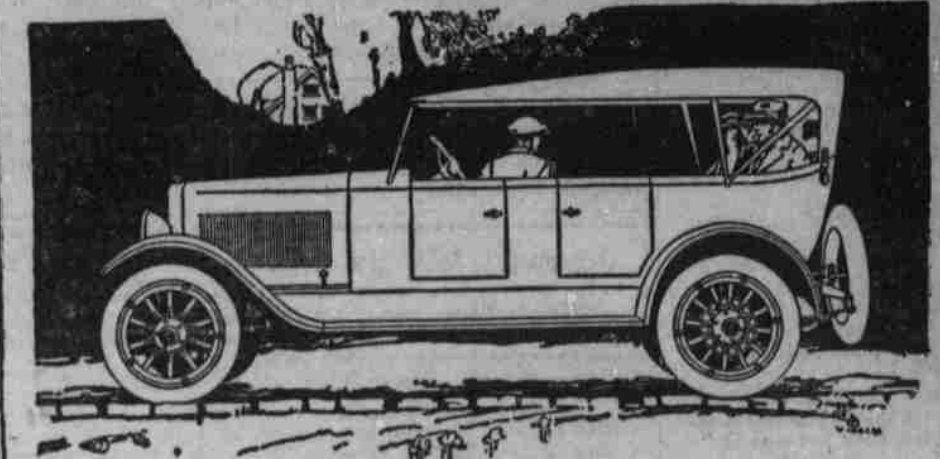
