Silvertown To Show Visitors Sights Of County Farm Areas

Silvertown, Or., May 28.—After a community dinner and barbecue held at noon today, 600 visitors attending the Lutheran conference in session here will be guests of the Community club in a "joy ride" through the county tributary to Silvertown. More than 100 cars have been secured for the occasion and the visitors, leaving Silvertown at 1 o'clock, will pass over the Waldo Hills to Macieny, and return by way of Salem and Howell Prairie. George W. Hubbs, who is responsible for the movement, will head the procession. The party will visit several of the big farms throughout the territory tributary to Silvertown, and if the time is not all occupied before returning the visitors will be taken out to the Lee farms east of town. They will also be taken to the two big mills and given an opportunity to see what Silvertown is doing in a commercial way.

Girl, 17, Talks On Birds Tonight

About three hundred children attended the two bird talks given by Miss Mary Raker at 9:30 and again at 11 at the public library this morning. Miss Raker, who is a student at Pacific university, is the daughter of W. S. Raker, director of the Audubon society, and she is a member of this organization. Her talks this morning were given in connection with the Audubon exhibit of bird and flower pictures on display this week at the library.

Miss Raker will give "A Bird Travelogue" tonight at 8 o'clock at the library and at this time she will relate some of the bird habits she has observed on her trips with the Audubon society. Her talk will be illustrated with some exceptionally good stereoscopic slides of bird pictures. Although Miss Raker is but seventeen years old, she is accustomed to speaking on her subject to adult audiences and she has been heard in Portland and other towns in the state.

The Audubon exhibit will close tonight. The exhibit of iris which was arranged in connection with the exhibit will be continued next week. There are now eighty varieties on display and there will be thirty more. The library will be closed Sunday and Monday.

California Track Men Win Meet

Four A Championship Comes West for First Time; Harvard Loses By Half Point

Harvard Stadium, Cambridge, Mass., May 28.—The championship of the colleges of the country on track and field went today to the west for the first time in athletic history. University of California captured the cup in a meet marked by closest competition and by a final margin of 1/2 point. California's winning total was 27 1/2 points; Harvard's for second honors was 27 points.

New Machine Gun for Army Strongest Yet

United States army has developed a .50 caliber machine gun capable of firing a bullet which, at 200 yards, will penetrate the one inch armor plate of battle tanks, Major Lee O. Wright, army ordnance department, announced at the annual convention of the ordnance section of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers at Rock Island arsenal.

The gun is modeled along the lines of the Browning machine gun used during the war and weighs 65 pounds, exclusive of the two gallons of water in the jacket. It has a muzzle velocity of 2600 feet a second, an average range of six to seven thousand yards and a range of 9000 to 10,000 yards.

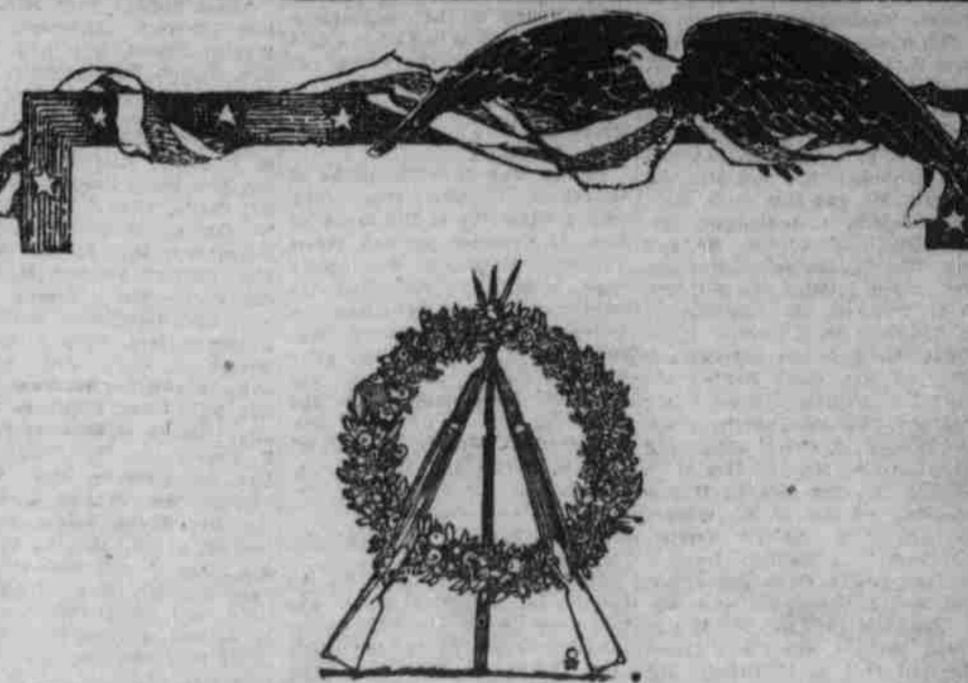
