Students of Willamette are taking advantage of the announcement made by Dean George Alden that extra units may now be obtained by those who are affected by the new entrance requirements for entrance. The change has been made recently, along with other schools of the state in accordance with the recommendations of a committee appointed by the Oregon Teachers association for the purpose of outlining a plan for a uniform system of entrance requirements over the state, in higher educational institutions. The number of possible vocational hours that would be accepted by Willamette was raised from three to five, and those who were forced to do extra work on account of an excess in vocation units can now receive full credit for them.

Prisoner Dies While at Work

Results of the autopsy in connection with the death of Ted Gayton, prisoner in the state penitentiary, who fell dead yesterday while mopping in the basement of one of the buildings, revealed nothing unusual, his death supposedly coming as a result of heart failure. While he was generally supposed to be in good health up to the moment of his death, one or two of the inmates said they had noticed that just before going in to work he seemed nervous and shaky.

Gayton was committed to the penitentiary on a statutory charge in Linn county in 1917 to serve from one to 15 years. He was paroled in November of 1918, but was returned in 1920 due to a violation of his parole. Gayton was 41 years of age.

As far as authorities know, he has no relatives. A letter found among his effects, addressed to a Mrs. Rabalais in Wisconsin, however, may reveal a sister.

Higher Street Car Fares And Gas Rates Asked

New tariffs providing for increases in street railway fares and in gas rates in the city of Astoria were filed with the public service commission this afternoon by the Pacific Power and Light company. The new tariffs become effective on June 30 unless in the meantime suspended by the commission pending an investigation into their reasonableness.

The new street railway tariff increases cash fares from five cents to seven cents with an increase in the price of fifty ride books from \$2.25 to three dollars and an increase from \$1.25 to \$1.75 in the price of 40 ride students books.

The new gas rates which are based on a volume basis entirely different from the present schedule and not comparable with the present rates for that reason are as follows:
 First 200 cubic feet, \$1.25.
 Next 400 cubic feet, \$2.50 per thousand.
 Next 15,000 cubic feet, \$2.10 per thousand.
 Next 30,000 cubic feet, \$1.75 per thousand.
 Next 50,000 cubic feet, \$1.55 per thousand.
