## Portlander Jailed For Failure To Pay Judgment Is Freed

Joseph Mozorosky, Portland Jeweler, imprisoned in the Multnomah county jail is entitled to release on bail pending the determination of the question of his incarceration for failure to pay a judgment of \$1600 in favor of Sol Swire decreed by the Multnomah county circuit court.

This is the gist of an opinion written by Justice Bean and handed down by the Supreme court Friday afternoon, the opinion fixing the amount of Mozorosky's bail at \$2000.

Following the rendition of judgment for \$1600 against Mozorosky in favor of Swire the latter secured his arrest and imprisonment for failure to pay the judgment. Mozorosky instituted habeas corpus proceedings to secure his release from jail which was denied him and he then appealed to the supreme court. Bail was also denied him on the ground that there was no provision in the Oregon code admitting a plaintiff to bail on an appeal in a habeas corpus proceeding.

The opinion does not attempt to pass upon the habeas corpus proceeding but merely admits the plaintiff to bail pending the determination of the other question which also involves his imprisonment.

## Leaving Time Of Guard Units Is Announced

Leaving schedules of valley troops for Camp Lewis where the general encampment of the Oregon national guard will be held, were announced yesterday from the office of the adjutant general.

All companies must have 70 per cent of their strength to attend the encampment. Every company in the state has far in excess of this amount, ready to go, with the exception of Company K at Independence, it was stated. Salem's company, F, will have most of its members present.

The schedule for leaving is: Salem, F company, 5:10 a. m. June 15; Independence, K company, 5:43 p. m. June 14; Dallas, company L, 5:35 p. m. June 14; Silverton, company I, 2:05 p. m. June 14; McMinnville, company A, 5:35 a. m. June 15; Woodburn, 3d battalion headquarters company, 5:48 a. m. June 15; Corvallis, company M, 5:05 p. m. June 14; Albany, 5th company coast artillery, 4:10 a. m. June 15.

All valley troops will leave Portland for Camp Lewis at 9:15 a. m. June 15. All Portland units will leave Portland for the camp at 9:45 a. m. June 15. Coast artillery units will leave Portland for Fort Stevens at 8:45 a. m. June 15.

Independence, Dallas, Silverton, and Corvallis organizations will be quartered in the Portland armory overnight.
