Highway Is Costly To Halsey

City Will Have to Pay Between \$15,000 and \$20,000 or Road Will Go 1,700 Feet Away

Albany, June 10.—"Halsey may pay the fiddler," according to the report here of a large delegation of Halsey taxpayers. They appeared before the court to seek some way of having the proposed Pacific highway built through Halsey. Originally the highway was to go through Halsey on a certain street which did not meet the approval of some, and as a result the subject of relocation was brought up under the new law which empowers the state highway commission to locate the highway and provides that the town through which the highway runs is required to pay half the expense. In this case Halsey would have to pay from \$15,000 to \$20,000 while if it had been left as originally located under the old law the state and county would have met the entire expense.

It is said that unless Halsey people furnish the money as provided by law the highway will probably be built on the old pioneer road, which is about 1700 feet west of Halsey.

Dallas Council Bars All Aliens From City Jobs

Dallas, June 10.—The city council met at its chambers Monday night and transacted the following business:

The ordinance which was read for the second time, pertaining to calling a special election for voting on fire apparatus was referred back to the ordinance committee for amendment.

The ordinance for the improvements on portions of Cherry, Ellis, Birch and Hayter streets, was presented and the auditor was instructed to advertise for bids, which will be opened on June 29, at 8 o'clock.

An ordinance against the employment of aliens in any city work was also passed. It provides that contractors are required to keep a list of all employees, said list to be subject to the inspection of any of the city officials at any time and that if aliens are employed on city work without the consent of the council, the contract becomes void.

The discussion of the bond issue at the special election for July 7 was one of the topics which created much interest and plans were made for informing the people as to the true conditions and needs of a septic tank and sewer system.

Inasmuch as the city will have free mail delivery some time in August, the matter of having all residences numbered and directing all property owners to comply with the number ordinance is one of the needs which is being investigated.
