Highway Is Costly To Halsey

City Will Have to Pay Between \$15,000 and \$20,000 or Road Will Go 1,700 Feet Away

Albany, June 10 .- "Halsey may pay the fiddler," according to the report here of a large delegation of Halsey taxpayers. They appeared before the court to seek some way of having the proposed Pacific highway built through Hal Originally the highway was to go through Halsey on a certain street which did not meet the approval of some, and as a result the subject of relocation was brought up under the new law which empowers the state highway commission to locate the highway and provides that the town brough which the highway runs is required to pay half the ex-pense. In this case Halsey would have to pay from \$15,000 to \$30,-000 while if it had been left as originally located under the old law the state and county would have met the entire expense.

It is said that unlss Halsey people furnish the money as provided by law the highway will probably be built on the old pioneer road, which is about 1700 feet west of Halsey.

Inasmuch as the city will have free mail delivery some time in August, the matter of having all residences numbered and directing all property owners to comply with the number ordinance is one of the needs which is being investigated.
