

Wheat Crop Estimated to Fall Short

Washington, June 10.—A drop of 51,000,000 bushels in the forecast of production of the winter wheat crop as compared with the estimate made a month ago featured the June crop report of the department of agriculture, issued today.

Washington, June 8.—The June crop report of the department of agriculture, issued today giving production forecasts based on the condition of the crops June 1, the condition on that date and acreages planted, follows:

- Winter wheat: production forecast 578,000,000 bushels; condition 77.9.
- Spring wheat: production 251,000,000; condition 93.4; acreage 18,928,000.
- All wheat: production 529,000,000; condition 82; acreage 56,744,000.
- Oats: production 1,495,000,000; condition 85.7; acreage 44,829,000.
- Barley: production 191,000,000; condition 87.1; acreage 7,713,000.
- Rye: production 71,000,000; condition 90.3.
- Hay production 101,000,000; condition 85.
- Apples: production 108,000,000; condition 41.8.
- Peaches: production 31,700,000; condition 45.5.

Homeseekers Will Be Here On July 28-29

Over 125 homeseekers from Omaha, Nebraska, will be in Salem July 28 and 29, according to the report of A. C. Bohrnstedt, made at the meeting of the Marion county Realtors' association in the Marion hotel this noon.

Mr. Bohrnstedt represented the association at a meeting of the commercial club secretaries in Portland Tuesday, and stated that the representatives of the state chamber of commerce who are now back in Omaha, were exercising great care in the selection of the homeseekers with a view to finding the best prospects and with the idea of meeting their wants satisfactorily. Mr. Bohrnstedt recommended that a representative from Marion county be sent to meet the train when it enters the state.

The speaker also pointed out that while the Union Pacific is spending its money in getting the tourists here, each new homeseeker established in the state means 100 pounds per year of additional tonnage hauled by the road. Lists turned into the committee, appraisements of which are thought to be too high, will be turned back to the office for further data, because of action taken by the board this noon.

Extreme care in giving location details is also urged by the committee in charge. It was also determined that no city property will go into the pamphlet to be given to the homeseekers, as the majority of them will be seeking farm land.
