Bumper Crop of Hay Promised In Lane County

Eugene, Ore., July 13.—Due to very favorable weather conditions probably the largest hay crop ever grown in Lane county is being harvested this year, according to Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent, who estimates that most of the crop will be in the barns by the end of the week. Wheat is ripening fast and early barley is practically ready for the binder, says Mr. Whitney, who has toured most of the county recently.

From all parts of Lane county come reports that acreage has produced about twice the hay this year that has been grown in former years. Farmers who have a certain number of acres seeded to hay calculated to supply their needs this year have cut twice the hay they need, continues Mr. Whitney, who estimates that there will be much more hay grown than fed locally this year.

Graft Beef Bone Into "Funny" Bone

London, July 12.—The case of a girl eleven years old who had a gap in her humerus (the bone of the upper part of the arm) filled by a beef bone is described by Dr. C. W. Gordon Bryan in the Lancet.

A piece of bone cut from the leg of an ox, boiled for 48 hours, shaped and drilled with holes was inserted into the gap and secured with pegs. The muscles were stitched round it. A plaster cast was applied to the limb. In three weeks the beef bone was firmly united and the patient left the hospital a month later.

Allied Supreme Council To Meet

Paris, July 12.—The allied supreme council probably will meet toward the end of this month, either in Boulogne or in Paris, it was announced today by the French foreign office.

The Ruhr question will be uppermost in the discussions and it is expected Great Britain may bring up the question of the evacuation of Dusseldorf, Duisburg and Ruhrort as a recognition of the disposition of the present German government to carry out the terms of the Versailles treaty.

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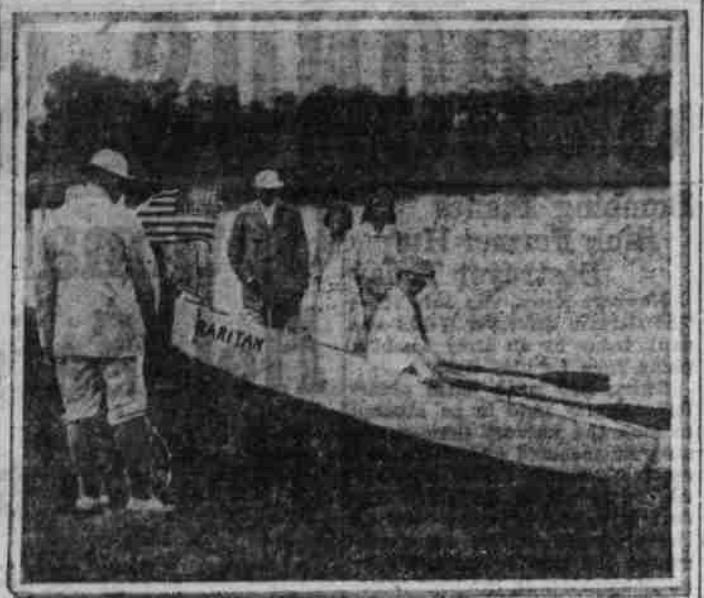
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Harding Helps Boys Launch Small Boat



Acting as sponsor at Raritan, N. J., of rowboat made by a nine-year-old boy, President Harding delivered a Fourth of July oration of a single sentence in tribute to the aspiration of American boyhood. The diminutive craft, which inspired the toast, was the Raritan, nine feet over all, conceived and built by Joseph Frelinghuysen, Jr., son of the senator from New Jersey, at whose home Mr. and Mrs. Harding were guests. The bank of an artificial lake was the scene of the launching and will be the home port of the Raritan as she sails a tramp course in search of misdirected golf balls. Specially constructed ways, whose upper end rested on a soap box, guided her down the bank. The president broke a beribboned bottle of mineral water across her bow and said: "As a tribute to American boyhood, who build castles in the air, who build boats and whose achievements in the future will build this country, I christen this boat, the handiwork of Joe Frelinghuysen, the 'Raritan'." Cherry Pack Is Big In Lane Co.

Eugene, July 13.—More than one million pounds of cherries have been canned by the Eugene Fruit Growers' association, according to Manager J. O. Holt, who reports that the Royal Anne crop is practically finished and that loganberries, raspberries and black cherries are the principal fruit coming into the cannery. The loganberry season is now at its height, in Mr. Holt's opinion.

About 1400 cases of cherries have been packed in the small cans and about 4500 cases in the large cans. The cases weigh about 40 pounds. In addition to this 1400 barrels of cherries were put up for early shipment and 10,000 pounds of cherries were dried.

This is one of the largest and most successfully canned crops of cherries in the history of the cannery, Mr. Holt states.

House Asked to Provide for Coast Naval Projects

Washington, July 12.—The house naval committee was urged today to provide by special legislation for projects for Pacific coast naval defenses eliminated from the naval appropriation bill. Representative Miller, republican, Washington, asked for a bill to permit acceptance from King county Washington, of a tract at Sand Point, near Seattle, for a naval aviation base, and purchase of eight hundred thousand dollars of adjoining property.

Old Maids Will Soon Rule World Says Economist

Paris, July 13.—Old maids are going to rule the world within another generation and when that happens all sensible men, looking for happy existences, will try to flee this earth and try out the planet Mars.

This is the opinion of Professor Girault, probably the best known French authority in political economy, who has just addressed his beliefs to the University of Politiers.

"Women are going to assume leadership, particularly in Europe, for the next hundred years," says Professor Girault. "This does not mean that civilization is becoming effeminate, nor does it result simply from the fact that women will be numerically stronger. But there are too many women for the marriageable males and hundreds of thousands of them are being compelled to make ill-assorted marriages in which the man, in nearly every case, is the weaker partner."

"In that way women are gaining the ascendancy and it is a certainty that any society ruled by women will lack intellectual courage, logic and initiative. Women married to men who are their inferiors will become embittered with life. Their experience will discourage other women who are thinking of marriage. Presently we will find a whole body of women, with a large and active majority of unmarried women controlling things, and men will have a very unhappy time."

Beauty enduring for eight thousand years on the face of a girl is a remarkable feature of a mummy that has been brought to London from Egypt and is now in the Egyptology section of the University College.

Grasshoppers By Bushels On Poisoned Land

Bend, Ore., July 13.—Dead grasshoppers can be scooped up by the bushel from the 20 acres at Crane Prairie, where a mixture of molasses, bran, sawdust, arsenic and lemon juice was scattered this week, County Agriculturalist D. L. Jamison reported, on a visit to Bend. There are still countless numbers of hoppers to be dealt with, however, and Jamison, regarding the work already done as merely a demonstration, will ship out quantities of material for a wholesale poisoning campaign Monday.

Equally good work has been done at Summit Prairie in the Ochoco forest by using banana oil for scent, and by using all sawdust and no bran, Jamison is advised, and, as the expense involved is less, the prescription will be changed when the war on the grasshopper pest begins in earnest.

Unless the insects are successfully combated this year, not only will the range for 1700 head of cattle be wiped out, but the plague of hoppers will spread rapidly in years to come, Jamison fears.

Lynn, Mass., July 13.—Music may have power to soothe a savage beast, but its effect on a pair of nice tame milk-cart horses is not quieting. Miss Elizabeth Master was seated at a piano at her home when a pair of horses, drawing a milk truck crashed through the side of the house. 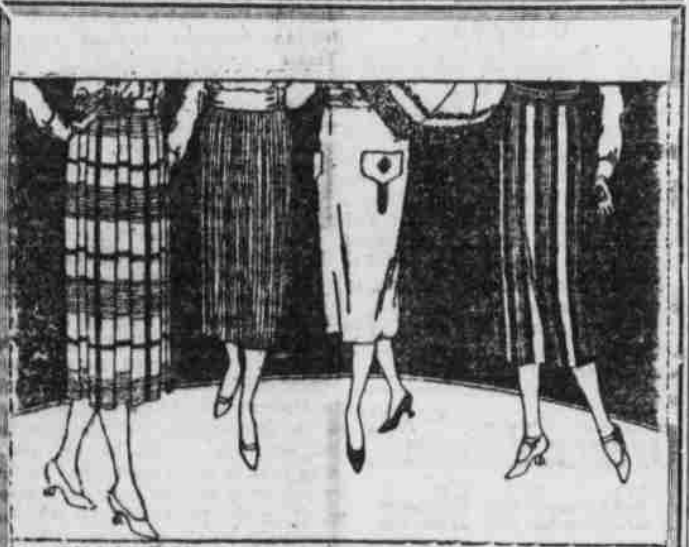

The investigation, the commission announced, will undertake to establish the relations of the roads with each other and "determine the manner and methods" in which the business of the companies have been conducted with a view to making a report and issuing orders that may be proper in connection with the investigation.
