## Turner Road Open To Traffic

### Salem - Turner Road Open For Traffic; Work On Silverton Road To Start

The Salem-Turner road will be open to traffic today according to an announcement made by Roadmaster W. J. Culver this morning. The Aumsville paving plant operated by the county, has completed its end of the work while the Bales plant will have its portion finished within the next two days. The pavement just completed is about 2 1/2 miles long and was constructed at a cost of \$15,000 a mile including the grading.

The Aumsville plant has started to close up the gap between Aumsville and Turner of about a half mile and is expected to have the work finished in the next five days. This will give continued paving between Aumsville and Salem except within the city limits of Turner, and about one-eighth of a mile near the boys training school where it was necessary to make a change in the road because of new buildings erected by the state. After the work is completed on the Aumsville and Turner roads the plant will work toward Sublimity.

The Salem plant when it completes work on the Salem-Turner road will close up the gap on the Silverton road of 2 1/2 miles near Howell Prairie.

The Mt. Angel plant completed two miles of paving on the Salem-Silverton road last week and has started work on the Woodburn-Mt. Angel road where a mile of pavement will be laid this season.

The Seaside paving plant is working between West Woodburn and Woodburn and has yet about a mile of the 2 1/2-mile stretch of paving yet to lay. Just what work this plant will do after this stretch is completed has not been decided by the roadmaster.

Shortage of sand and gravel may hold up paving for a few days, but it is thought that the entire paving program of the county outlined for this year will be completed. The paving plants employ a total of 160 men.

## Leaguers To Gather Soon At Jefferson

Plans are rapidly being completed for the opening of the Epworth League institute at Jefferson July 25 to 31, one of the two conventions given this year under the auspices of the Oregon conference of the Methodist church.

Last year was the most successful of all years in the history of the Epworth League here, and authorities have set the goal for an attendance this year at 500.

Prominent among the leaders on the program at Jefferson are a number of local men, Rev. Blaine E. Kirkpatrick, pastor of the First Methodist church; Rev. E. E. ## Youths Fire On Katz Auto; Two Caught, Freed

The Dalles, Or., July 21.—Two of the boys charged by Alma Katz of Portland with having fired on his automobile on the Columbia river highway between Hood River and The Dalles, have been arrested and released on their own recognizance.

These boys are Boyd Camel and Clayton Rand. Three others who were in the car which passed the Katz car are said to be Enos Ashere, Wilbur Bywater and Claude Gordon. All are believed to be working in the wheatfields in Washington. The cases of Camel and Rand will be delayed until the other boys can be apprehended.

Both Camel and Rand, in statements to Sheriff Levi Christiansen, denied that they or any one in their car fired at the Katz's car or that they were carrying firearms. They said they threw gravel at the car when Katz refused to turn from the center of the road to permit them to pass.

## Craig's Return to Belfast No Indication of Rupture In Peace Parleys, Claim

Belfast, Ireland, July 21.—The return to Belfast of Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier and the members of his cabinet from London, must not be taken as a rupture of the negotiations. It was declared here by Colonel Spender, secretary of the peace delegation, on its arrival here. It is thought that the delegation will be recalled to London next week, he declared.

None of the cabinet members would have anything to say for publication.

Emmon DeValera is regarded by the Ulster unionists as a visionary, and the feeling in unionist circles here is that no discussions among all the parties concerned in the Irish settlement will be possible until he considerably modifies his position.

Stand Is Approved. When Sir James Craig saw the republican leader in Dublin before the recent Irish parliamentary elections the Ulster premier is declared in unionist quarters to have heard a long disquisition on an Irish republic, and unionists here expressed belief today that Mr. DeValera had expressed himself similarly in his interviews with Premier Lloyd-George.

The attitude of the Ulster premier and his colleagues, as expressed by Sir James in his statement made in London last night in which he declared Ulster was

determined to maintain her present status, with her own parliament, is cordially approved by the Belfast unionists in general.

"There was never any other outcome of the negotiations possible," says the Belfast News-Letter, "except in the minds of those who would have sacrificed us on the altar of a false peace. We shall have nothing to do with any settlement terms that infringe upon or diminish the status of our parliament, and we base that attitude on the same ground as DeValera makes his claim to self-determination."

On the other hand, the Irish News, which voices the views of Joseph Devlin, nationalist, says: "If the six specially chosen Ulster counties are to self-determine themselves into ruinous conflict with the rest of Ireland, why deny the claim of any county to self-determine itself out of association with secessionists. The claim insisted upon by Sir James Craig is

on all fours with that put forward by the southern states of the American republic sixty years ago. That is a true and exact parallel. The formula that Ireland is like unto the secessionist states has been abandoned."

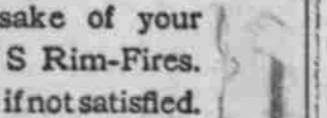
## First Armory Drill Checks Are Received

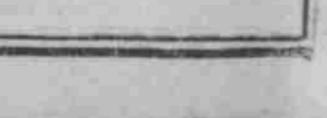

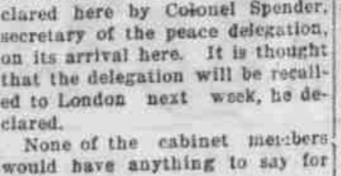
