## Now Is Time To Spray Potatoes With Bordeaux

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Aug. 7.—Spraying potatoes for blight in certain sections of Oregon is important this time of year, says M. B. McKay, associate plant pathologist.

"Producers living in western Oregon—particularly in the lower Columbia and Willamette valleys and also in the coast counties should be especially watchful of their crop for late blight," suggests Professor McKay. "One grower near Salem lost his entire crop last year on account of this disease. It rarely attacks the crops of the upper valley sections."

"Bordeaux mixture, 5-4-50, is considered the best spray for the blight. This solution will not kill but will check its spread. When the blight is expected to appear the first applications should be made every 10 days or two weeks if the disease seems extremely destructive."

Copper sulphate, diluted 1 pound to 10 gallons of water, is also good spray according to Professor McKay, provided Bordeaux mixture has not been used. It should be sprayed well on the vines and well on the surface of the ground. Potatoes can be dug a few days after this application, but after the last spraying of Bordeaux mixture one should not dig until two weeks after the vines have died. This is to give the germs a chance to die out so the potatoes will not become infected. "The benefits of spraying offset by far the cost and trouble," says this specialist. "Spraying increases the yield whether or not potatoes have blight. It makes the plants more vigorous, and increases the yield of tubers. It also repels fleas beetles which is a common potato pest."

## Cottage Grove Cannery Sells \$23,000 Pack

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 8.—The cannery here has sold \$23,000 of its future pack for this year and could dispose of a larger quantity were there a certainty that it could be delivered. The price being offered has advanced substantially over that offered earlier in the season. The principal items contracted are beans, berries, apples and prunes. No contracts have been offered for pears.

Manager Knowles believes the canning business will on almost a normal basis this year.

## Berry Growers Organize Union

## M. E. Preachers Get \$24,988,323

Chicago, Aug. 8.—The total ministerial support of the Methodist Episcopal church for 1920 was \$24,988,323, according to a survey made public today by Dr. C. M. Barton of the division of appropriations of the Methodist committee on conservation and advance. Of this amount, pastors' salaries, including house rent, were \$21,944,613; the district superintendents' salaries, \$1,369,211; bishops' salaries, \$214,089; and for conference claimants or for preachers' pensions, \$1,260,409.

## Big Library Circulation For Summer

Although there has been a slight falling off during July the city library circulation is holding up remarkably well for the summer months, according to Flora M. Case, librarian, who is making out the monthly report. Books totaling 4864 have been circulated from the main library in July in comparison to 3955 during the same month last year, the latter figure including the circulation from branch library which is not yet available for the past month. The branch library circulation, usually about 400, will bring the figure for this month well above 5000.

During July 143 volumes were added to the library, making a total of 16,940 books on hand August 1. Eighty new names were added to the roll of patrons during the month. The biggest circulation for one day was 281 volumes.

Many patrons are taking advantage of the vacation privileges in effect until September, which allows a patron to take up to six books for an unlimited number of days.

## Farmers Want Union County

La Grande, Or., Aug. 6.—County Agent Harry G. Avery has almost daily requests from owners of dairy cows for tuberculin testing under the arrangement whereby the state and federal government pay for the testing and reimburse those owners of cows whose animals are condemned because of being tubercular.

At present Mr. Avery has over 1000 cows listed whose owners want them tested, but so far it has been impossible to secure a tester as 90 per cent of the testing being done in the state is being done in the western part.

## Seaside Opens Great Seawall

Seaside, Or., Aug. 8.—Before 35,000 people Governor O'Connell Sunday formally dedicated Seaside's seawall and promenade to the people of the northwest. Speaking of the undertaking just completed he complimented the citizens upon their united efforts and predicted that within a short time the board walk of Atlantic City would be relegated to oblivion by the coming resort of the northwest.

## Harley-Davidson Makes Price Cut

Reductions Average Over 25 Percent; New Color Being Featured  
Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 8.—Sweeping price reductions, effective immediately, have been announced by the Harley-Davidson Motor company, Milwaukee, Wis., manufacturers of the Harley-Davidson motorcycle.

The electrically equipped, three speed, twin cylinder machine, the most popular model, has been reduced from \$485 to \$365, and model 22-JD, a popular sidecar machine, has been cut to \$390 from \$520. The new prices on sidecars and sidevans are as much as 28 per cent lower than the former prices. Model 22-LR, the leader in the line of sidecars, is now priced at \$115, \$45 less than the price before August 1. Reductions in the prices of all of the other models are practically in the same proportion as those described.

"The reductions announced have only been made possible by assuming great inventory losses and through putting into effect the utmost economies in every branch of our organization. And these prices are not a preliminary move, a half way measure, but we believe we have based on prices on the material costs, etc. that will prevail many months hence and cut our prices to bed rock with one big swoop. The quality standards which have characterized our products will be strictly maintained." This statement was released in connection with the announcement by Walter Davidson, president of the company.

Simultaneous with the announcement of the new prices, the 1922 models which feature a striking, new brewster green color, to displace the olive drab army dress used for several years, and also a number of mechanical refinements, have also been announced.

## Lloyd-George Denies He Will Not Be Present

Paris, Aug. 8.—Statements made here this forenoon on apparently good authority that Mr. Lloyd-George, the British prime minister, had announced his decision not to go to the United States to attend the disarmament conference in Washington opening November 11 were given official denial this afternoon. The British delegation attending the allied supreme council here authorized the following announcement: "There is absolutely no truth in the report that Mr. Lloyd-George has stated he will not go to the Washington conference of November 11."

The British prime minister's secretary added: "The point is that the British cabinet has not yet considered the personnel of the British delegation to the Washington conference."

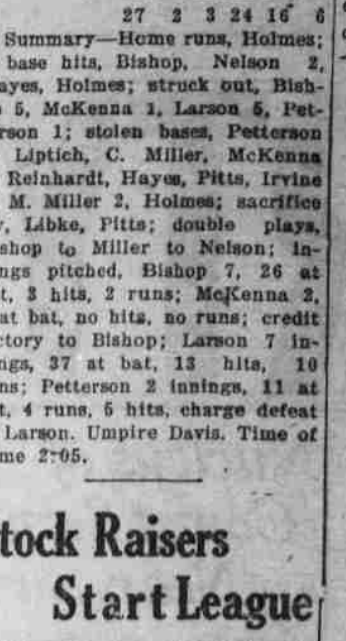
