New Motor Driven Now Is Time To Spray Polatoes With Bordeaux

Oregon Agricultural College. Corvallia, Aug. 8 .- Spraying potatoes for blight in certain sections of Oregon is important this time of year, says M. B. McKay, associate plant pathologist.

"Producers living in western Oregon-particularly in the lower Columbia and Willamette valleys and also in the coast countles should be especially watchful of their crop for late blight," suggests Professor McKay. "One grower near Salem lost his entire crop last year on account of this disease. It rarely attacks the grops of the upper valley sections. "Bordeaux mixture, 5-4-50, is considered the best spray for the

light. This solution will not kill but will check its spread. When he blight is expected to appear the first applications should be made every 10 days or two weeks. If the disease sems extremely destructive."

Copper sulphate, diluted pound to 10 gallons of water, h also good apray according to Professor McKay, provided Bordeaux mixture has not been used. It should be sprayed well on the rines and well on the surface of the ground. Potatoes can be dug a fow days after this application. but after the last spraying of Hordeaux mixture one should not dig

until two weeks after the vines have died. This is to give the germs a chance to die out so the potatoes will not become infected.

"The benefits of spraying offset by far the cost and trouble," say i this specialist. "Spraying increases the yield whether or not potatoes have blight. 




