

Engineers To Report On Car Firm's Activity

Engineers of the public service commission who have been at work checking up maintenance and reconstruction work of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company will complete their task about September 10. As soon as the data thus gathered can be compiled a conference will be called for consideration of the company's rehabilitation program past and future.

Such, in brief, is the reply of Fred G. Buchtel, of the public service commission to the demand sounded by Frank S. Grant, Portland city attorney, that the street railway company be compelled to carry out its improvement program as contemplated in the eight cent rate order or reduce its fares to their former status.

With a view to supplementing the work of the commission's engineers Buchtel has also requested Franklin T. Griffith, president of the street railway company, to file with the commission a complete statement of the reconstruction and maintenance work completed, contemplated and in progress since June 15, 1920, together with the number of men employed in connection therewith, the number of jobs at present actually under way and such other data as is pertinent or determining in relation to the matter at hand.

Reclamation Of Desert Land Waits Report

The state desert land board is ready to enter into a contract with the North Canal company for the reclamation of the unreclaimed 27,000 acres in the present central Oregon project as soon as the company is prepared to show a feasible plan of reclamation including an estimate of costs, and various other requirements provided by the state irrigation laws. This decision was reached by the board at a meeting here this afternoon.

These requirements include a showing of the North Canal company's financial ability to complete the project and the company's right to sufficient water to irrigate the lands in question.

The company will also be required to show evidence of the transfer of the lands in question from the Central Oregon Irrigation company to the new organization and a complete release of all liens and satisfaction of outstanding obligations covering an un sold lands.

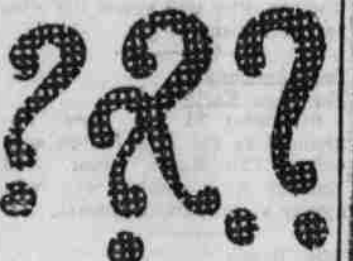
