## What's New On The Market

Eggs fairly leaped in price yesterday until a price of 39 cents was offered by merchants to farmers. The rise is due to scarcity here, but such a great increase seems to be unwarranted.

The merchants driving the price up so high are in danger of making the farmer dissatisfied when the demand is less. Holding eggs for an increase may bring little benefit to the producer and seller, because a loss in quality may result from the increase in price.

Eggs held for ten days by the producers cannot be sold as fresh and there is bound to be some dissatisfaction expressed by the consumer. There is little room for speculation in eggs for the reason that they are a perishable product. The bottom price of eggs today is offered by shippers and is 34 cents. The lowest retail price is 42 cents.

Oranges have increased to 70 cents a dozen, the wholesale prices have risen from \$5.75 and \$6.25 to \$7 and \$7.50. Bananas have also gone up a half cent on the pound.

Onions are still going up, the wholesale price having reached \$3 while the retail is now five cents a pound. If the demand from other parts of the country keep up, the price will undoubtedly go higher.
