What's New On The Market

A fine shipment of cauliflower has just been received from Portland is far superior in quality to the local stuff. With the wholesale price of \$1.75 a dozen, the retail price could well be 20 cents a head. Retail dealers state, however, that the crates do not contain a dozen and that they must charge from 25 to 30 cents. The size of the heads in the new shipment compared to those of local production would warrant the price being quoted higher, if it were not for the wholesale quotations.

A small quantity of very late strawberries, known as Ever-bearing, were offered today on the market at 20 cents a box. The fact that they are on the market in October is extraordinary. Butter dropped three cents on wholesale and retail prices this morning, with a corresponding decrease in butterfat. In stores butter is quoted 54 cents a pound and in creameries, wholesale, 48 and 49 cents.

Local head lettuce, equally as good as that from the California Imperial valley, is on the market at 10 cents a head or three for a quarter. Sweet potatoes are selling four pounds for 25 cents at which price they will undoubtedly remain throughout the season. Extra fancy Comice eating pears are selling for 25 cents a basket. Up to today poultry offerings have been generally small, farmers being busy with their winter grain sowing. When this work is completed poultry will undoubtedly be more plentiful.

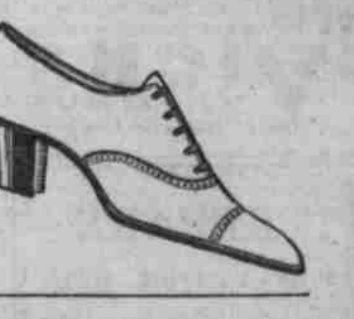
