

Demurrer In Wurtzbarger Case Is Filed

Portland, Oct. 21.—(Special)—The right of the United States court to try Mrs. Alma Louise Wurtzbarger of Salem for the murder of her husband on the Chemawa Indian reservation on September 4 is challenged in a demurrer filed in the federal court here Thursday afternoon by H. E. Haney, counsel for the woman.

Haney alleges that the murder indictment against Mrs. Wurtzbarger, which was returned by the federal grand jury, does not state facts sufficient to constitute a crime against the United States, and, second, that "it appears on the face of the indictment that this court and the courts of the United States have no jurisdiction to determine this cause."

The demurrer will regularly come up for argument on Monday, October 31, but as the court will have before it the Byron-Todd land fraud case on that date, hearing on the Wurtzbarger demurrer may be deferred.

Haney will attempt to prove that the government has no jurisdiction over criminal matters on the reservation when no Indian charges are involved. United States Attorney Lester W. Humphreys will resist this allegation on the grounds that the reservation is government property, holding the same rating as a post-office site or fort, and will contend that all criminal matters having their origin on the reservation should be tried in the federal court, the same as all criminal events occurring on postoffice property.

Both Oregon members of the Pacific coast conference get into tomorrow's opening games of the 1921 race for the western football championship, the Oregon Agricultural college playing the University of Washington at Corvallis and the University of California meeting the University of Oregon, the conference champion, at Berkeley.

New Business of Northwest Mills Declines

New lumber business totaled 77,456,366 feet for the week ending October 15, according to reports from 110 mills to West Coast Lumbermen's association.

The volume of new business fell off slightly from the preceding two weeks, but still remained above both production and shipments.

Thirty-six percent of the total new business was for water delivery. This amounted to 28,166,366 feet, of which 18,388,366 feet was represented in coastwise and intercoastal orders; and 9,788,000 feet in export orders.

Business for delivery by rail amounted to 1,643 cars. Shipments by rail totaled 1,554 cars. The unshipped balance in the rail trade is reported at 3,592 cars. Production at 65,025,043 was only 15 percent below normal for mills in operation.

Shipments totaled 63,792,927 feet. Of water shipments 9,007,899 feet moved coastwise and 8,165,028 feet cleared for overseas.

Accident Board Sues Mill Owner

Dallas, Or., Oct. 21.—Suit has been filed in the circuit court by the state industrial accident commission against Homer A. Robb, who conducts a sawmill a short distance from Dallas. The complaint states that the defendants accepted the provisions of the working man's compensation act and that, as they failed to notify the accident commission that they rejected the benefits of the commission, they are now indebted for the fees not contributed from May 1, 1919 to June 30, 1920, to the extent of \$43.76. That the period from July 1, 1920, to August 31, 1920, aggregates the sum of \$8.25. The accident commission asks for a decree for

\$52.31, together with a penalty of 10 per cent, together with their costs and disbursements.

The suit was filed by C. C. Page, attorney for the commission, and J. H. Helgeson, district attorney for Polk county.

\$70,000 Road Bond Proposal Backed By Club

Dallas, Or., Oct. 21.—At a meeting of the Dallas Commercial club last night it was decided to favor strongly an affirmative vote on the proposal to levy a special tax of \$70,000 for the benefit of the roads. The special election called by the county court for this purpose will be held on November 8.

The matter was discussed from all its angles, and it was practically the unanimous opinion that the special tax should be levied and the money spent on the roads. It was shown that much road work has been done during the present season, but the available money did not permit of nearly all the roads being improved.

Responding to a communication from the Dallas Women's club action was taken in favor of improving and keeping green the court house lawn. It was pointed out by several members of the club that none out of ten summer visitors comment upon the disgraceful condition of the lawn.

The proper committee was authorized to appear with the Women's club committee before the county court and ask the improvement. It was also decided to ask the library board to keep up the lawn about the library building.

Beginning with the meeting Wednesday evening, November 2, a lunch will be served. A committee was appointed to have charge. It is planned to have this develop into a regular feature, with out-of-town speakers present to talk.

Cross Country Trip Made By Salem Couple

Covering a total distance of 1960 miles in a transcontinental automobile trip, Mr. and Mrs. George N. Willis, 744 North Commercial street, returned to Salem on October 13, glad that they had made the drive, but perfectly satisfied with western ways, spirit and climate.

The couple left here June 1, drove to Pendleton, spent a few days in Idaho Falls before going to Salt Lake, and over the Lincoln highway through Nebraska and Iowa to Chicago, going from there through Indianapolis to Washington, D. C., by way of Columbus, Ohio. From the national capital they went to Philadelphia, thence to New York, driving north to Boston, where they started on their return trip, crossing the New England states to Niagara Falls and following the Great Lakes to Chicago, where they started traversing the Lincoln highway to Salt Lake and from the Utah capital making San Francisco and Santa Rosa.

According to Mr. Willis the potato crop in Nebraska and Iowa was a complete failure this year, but the corn had a yield that was entirely satisfactory.

During an electric storm in Nebraska, it rained three inches in 45 minutes, making the roads almost impassable. Nearly all roads except near cities, east of Oregon were dirt roads, but were kept in fair condition by every farmer dragging a certain section after each rain.

Hospitality in the east is no-

ing compared to western advantages for the tourists. The cities have no auto parks and the people still cling to the antiquated idea that the west is still but half civilized, according to the impressions received by Mr. Willis.

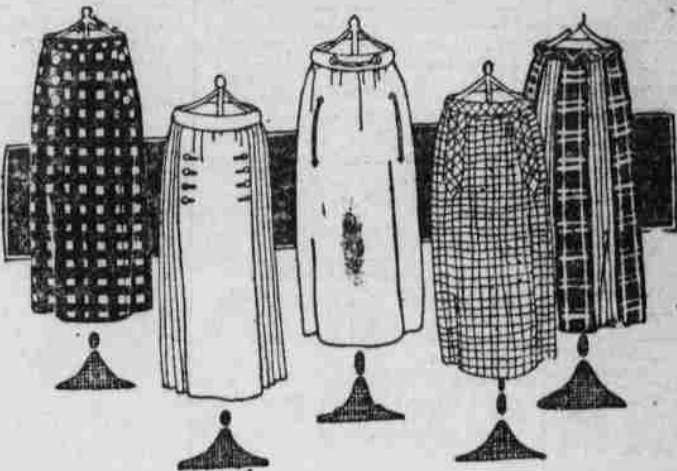
