JAP PREMIER STABBED

LAWYERS IN GREBE CASE HOT

Attorneys Wrangle In Woman Pilot's Trial; Jury, Out Over Three Hours, Disagrees

Caustic verbosity which, apparently, was erroneously calculated by Walter C. Winslow, attorney for the defense, and Barney Goldstein, private prosecutor, to wither the opposition during the trial of Mrs. Edith Grebe, of Spokane, charged with careless and reckless driving, obviously failed of its purpose in the justice court here yesterday afternoon. After their several verbal clashes, staged with much gusto, both left the court room apparently well satisfied.

Jury Out 3 Hours
Incidentally, wherein the Grebe case was concerned, honors were even. Valiantly cloistered for more than three hours, the jury last night declared that agreement among its members belonged in the category of things impossible. The vote stood three to three.

Mr. Winslow insisted that Mr. Goldstein had come all the way from Portland for no other purpose than to attempt to clinch his client's civil suit against Mrs. Grebe. On the other hand, Mr. Goldstein announced, among many other allegations, that Mr. Winslow was attempting to "try" everybody with the exception of Mrs. Grebe.

Washington, Nov. 4.—The Smoot plan for business sales tax of one half of one per cent of gross sales exceeding \$5,000 a year was rejected today by the senate, 46 to 25.

Pay Alimony or Go To Jail Says Judge Bingham

Chicago, Nov. 4.—The federal court of appeals today granted the petition for an appeal of the United Mine Workers of America of an injunction handed down by Judge A. B. Anderson at Indianapolis last week and set hearing of the case for Wednesday, November 16. The injunction will not be suspended in the meantime, Judge Baker announced.

Partial Census of School Children Gives Boys Lead

School census returns from 74 districts of Marion county which have been received by the office of the county school superintendent give a total of 4038 pupils enrolled in schools outside of Salem. There still remain 54 districts yet to be heard from including Athens, Ohio, Nov. 4.—Between 300 and 400 more miners in the Hocking fields today left their work as a protest against the federal court order abolishing the check off system.

Mail Robbery Suspect Held In Los Angeles

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 4.—Los Angeles police today arrested a man declared by them to be suspected of complicity in the theft last night of four mail pouches from a truck in the downtown section. It was said the name of the man arrested would be withheld for a time.

McNary Amendment To Tax Bill Passes

Washington, Nov. 4.—Senator McNary's amendments to the tax bill to permit deductions for losses to property by the elements, to be made on basis of value March 1, 1913, if property was acquired before that time, instead of original costs, have been adopted by senate. This change affects considerable tracts of timber destroyed by fire.

Third Bank Fails Western Nebraska

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 4.—The third bank failure this week in Nebraska occurred today with the closing of the Home State Bank at Dunning, Blaine county. Hart received a telegram from one of his examiners, L. C. Oppen, that the institution was "up against it" and had closed.

Mrs. Southard Found Guilty

Twin Falls, Idaho, Nov. 4.—Lyda Southard was found guilty of second degree murder today of Edward F. Meyer her fourth husband by a jury in district court here this afternoon. The verdict was returned after 23 hours deliberation.

\$225 Reported by "Y" Workers Today

Two hundred and twenty five dollars were received today with the eleven subscriptions reported in the Y. M. C. A. drive for a \$9000 fund to carry on the work of the association in 1922, bringing the total now received up to \$8749.50.

Hubby Wouldn't Recognize Her On Street Says Wife

Charging cruel and inhuman treatment Florence E. Hawk filed complaint for divorce against her husband, Charles A. Hawk, in which she stated that he refused to speak to her on the street and that he preferred the company of other women.

Ten Million For Enforcement of Dry Law Asked

Washington, Nov. 4.—Congress will be asked for ten million dollars for the enforcement of prohibition during the next fiscal year, an increase of \$2,500,000 over the appropriation for the current year.

Coal Miners Call a Strike

Pittsburgh, Pa., Nov. 4.—The executive board of district number 5, United Mine Workers of America at a special meeting here today, decided to call a strike at midnight Monday, November 7, in the Pittsburgh district. This action was taken after the Pittsburgh Coal Producers association had notified the miners that the "check off" system would be discontinued.

Charles Formally Dethroned Today

Budapest, Nov. 4.—Former Emperor Charles was dethroned and the Hapsburg dynasty was ousted from Hungary by a bill adopted by the Hungarian national assembly today. Count Stefan Bethlen, the premier, introduced the measure in the assembly yesterday and it was expected the debate would last for at least two days. Final action upon it, however, was taken today.

American Finance Minister In Ulster

Belfast, Nov. 4.—Sir James Craig, the premier who is about to leave for London for consultations over the question of an Irish settlement, presided over a meeting of the Ulster cabinet this morning. John Milne Barbour, member of a Paterson, N. J., family, was installed as finance minister temporarily, owing to a breakdown in the health of the incumbent, Hugh McDowell Pollock.

TAKASHI HARA SLAIN AT TOKIO IN SECOND ATTEMPT UPON LIFE

Assassination Comes at Dramatic Moment When Japanese Delegation Is Assembling for Washington Conference—Was Referred To As Lloyd George of Japan—Achieved Cooperation of Military and Civil Elements

Tokio, Nov. 4.—(By The Associated Press.) Premier Hara was fatally stabbed in the breast today at the railroad station in Tokio.

Washington, Nov. 4.—Japanese embassy officials and members of the Japanese delegation to the armament and Far Eastern conferences received the first news from the Associated Press and were greatly depressed.

Before the departure of the Japanese delegation from Tokio threatening letters had been received by various members of the cabinet and Prince Tokugawa himself just before embarking on the steamer for the United States received a fantastically worded document threatening him with assassination unless he achieved results at Washington of benefit to his country and warning him also that he must not be too "foreign" in his attitude while in the United States.

Man Had 130 Gallons Wine; Fine Is Paid

Frank Nosack, a farmer who resides near Salem, paid a fine of \$125 last night after he had pleaded guilty before Judge G. E. Unruh to a charge of having intoxicating liquor in his possession. The fine was not paid, however, until Sheriff O. D. Bower was about to lead him into his cell in the county jail.

Dr. Brumfield Recovers From Wound Rapidly

With a clean shave and fresh from his bath Dr. Richard M. Brumfield, condemned slayer of Dennis Russell, Douglas county hermit, today appears to be in a much better condition physically than at any time since he was dressed in at the state prison here, according to prison officials this morning.

Put Bars Up On Smuggling Aliens O'er Canadian Line

Sarnia, Ont., Nov. 4.—American immigration officials, alleging that many aliens were being smuggled across the board at Sarnia, and other ports along the St. Clair river, today refused to permit any one to enter the United States at this point without undergoing most rigid examination.

Reduce Rate of Bank Discount

Washington, Nov. 4.—Reduction in the rediscount rate of the Cleveland federal reserve bank from 5 1/2 per cent to 5 per cent effective next Monday, was announced today by the federal reserve board.

Henderson Gets 10 Years In Pen

Portland, Ore., Nov. 4.—Joseph J. Henderson, who was convicted of manslaughter for killing his former wife, Gertrude Henderson, at her home here August 5, was today sentenced to 10 years in the state penitentiary. Henderson stabbed his divorced wife with a butcher knife, according to evidence at his trial on the charge of first degree murder. He was arrested when found in a chicken house behind his mother's home, having shot himself through the right eye and slashed his wrists with a razor.

Mark Drops Again
