

# SLACKERS NUMBER NOW 125

## Eighty-two Additional Draft Evaders Are Announced by Military Authorities

Note—In the following story are listed the names of Oregon men who failed to respond for service in the military forces of the United States when their order numbers were drawn by the local draft boards by whom they were registered and given their order numbers. In some instances it has been found that men so classified as deserters were already in some branch of the military service of the United States or the allies when their numbers were drawn. The names are published for two reasons—to expose those who willfully sought to evade military service in the time of the nation's peril, and to enable those who are wrongfully listed on the military records of the United States government, without their knowledge, to clear their records and erase from their reputations the stigma of being known as draft evaders. Any person having knowledge that any of the men listed in the following article did serve in the military forces of the United States or the allies during the world war is requested to communicate at once with the office of the adjutant general of the state of Oregon, or with the commander of Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, Salem, or with the managing editor of The Capital Journal.

Eighty-two additional names in eight of the counties of the state, have been supplied by the headquarters of the Ninth Corps area as draft evaders, making a total of 125 deserters announced within the last few days by military authorities.

Though only one division of Marion county has been published thus far, no men from this section of the country are on the recent list from the Ninth corp given for publication.

Portland, Nov. 4.—About noon tomorrow, or the same instant that Fred H. Royston steps thru the barbed wire gate at the entrance to the federal prison on McNeil's island, he will no longer be an American citizen. Sentence of Royston, who was formerly a Methodist preacher at Salem, on Wednesday by United States District Judge R. S. Bean to serve 18 months at the prison for white slavery, carries with it the cancellation of citizenship the minute he enters the prison doors.
