

LOGGING ACTIVITY REVIVING

Espee Bulletin Says Lumber Industry in Polk Experiencing Record Boom

After a long period of inactivity in the logging and lumber industry in Polk county, Oregon, is enjoying the greatest boom ever experienced in the history of the industry in that region, according to an article which is to appear in the November number of the Southern Pacific company's "Bulletin." The territory referred to is served by the Falls City branch of the Southern Pacific company.

At Black Rock, 300 men are getting out approximately 350,000 feet of logs daily. Fifty percent of this is sawed into lumber at Dallas, and the balance is taken to Wilsona, dumped into the Willamette river and floated to Salem and there milled by the C. K. Spaulding company.

Out in the woods on the Valley and Siletz railroad about 200 men are employed and the result of their daily output is in the neighborhood of 250,000 feet of logs. One third of this is handled at the mills at Valsecs and Hoskins, and delivered to the Southern Pacific in that finished product at Crisp. The balance is delivered to the Southern Pacific company in logs for movement to Falls City and Salem for cutting up.

This territory is quite rough and mountainous and most of the logging is done by what is called the "sky line" method, which involves the use of a very expensive outfit, consisting of heavy wire cables and other paraphernalia. The heavy cables are sometimes stretched across canyons and in that manner logs are carried from one high ridge to another.

The Willamette Valley Lumber company and the Spaulding Lumber company both have logging roads running out to Black Rock, one on each side of the mountain, and in order to get up the mountain sides, they are required to use "switchbacks" on account of the excessive grades. The logs are brought into Black Rock from a distance of 12 to 15 miles.

The situation on the Falls City branch is unique. In place of the usual procedure of handling loaded cars of logs in one direction and empty on the return trip, in this territory loads of logs are handled in both directions. One logging company logs on the Valley Siletz and its product is cut up at Falls City, while the other company, logging back of Black Rock has its product hauled to Dallas for cutting up.

The mill at Falls City employs 175 men and has an output of 130,000 feet daily. The Dallas mill employs 175 men and has a daily output of 140,000 feet. At Valsecs and Hoskins, located on the Valley and Siletz railroad, 340 men are employed in the mills which have a daily production of approximately 225,000 feet of lumber, all of which is routed over Southern Pacific lines and delivered to the connection at Crisp.

Whiskey Imported By Scotch Consul For First Time

General Diaz Arrives Amid Great Din

General Armando Diaz, the greatest Italian hero since Garibaldi to visit America, was acclaimed by thousands when he arrived in New York and vicinity made a holiday of it. Two ferryboats and a fleet of private yachts and tugs, packed to the guards with cheering sons and daughters of Italy, were waiting off Quarantine for General Diaz. A flag-waving crowd, conservatively estimated at 150,000, greeted him at the Battery and cheered his triumphal march up Broadway to City Hall, where Mayor Hylan conferred the freedom of the city. The photograph shows the procession moving up Broadway, and General Diaz and Colonel Mervyn Buckley, who was appointed by the Secretary of War to act as his personal aide.

Millionaire Is Kidnaped, Omaha Police Allege

Chicago, Nov. 4.—Rolla D. Mack, personal bellboy for Harry M. Phillips, a former Chicagoan said to have made a fortune in Mexican mining operations, was taken into custody here today when he arrived from Omaha to complete arrangements for Phillips' arrival from California. He was detained on charges of Omaha police, who charged that Phillips kidnaped the boy from a hotel there.

Further action in the case awaited the arrival of Phillips.

On a charge of permitting her dog to run at large, Police Judge Earl Race yesterday sentenced Mrs. Donna Stranahan to pay a fine of \$10.

He then suspended sentence. Mrs. Stranahan was arraigned Wednesday, but was granted 24 hours in which to enter her plea. Officers said they had warned Mrs. Stranahan to keep the animal tied up. Mrs. Stranahan resides at 2330 Oak street.

Former Jefferson Editor is Dead

G. M. Humphrey, for 25 years editor of the Jefferson Review, died this morning at his home after a long illness. Mr. Humphrey was a son of George Humphrey, a Linn county pioneer who settled in Oregon during the early history of the state. About a year ago Mr. Humphrey sold his interest in the Review and went to Canada, returning to Jefferson after a brief stay in the north and was taken sick. He is survived by his wife and two sons, one residing in Roseburg and the other in Eugene. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Pardon Asked for Alleged Murders

Washington, Nov. 4.—Pardon for five American soldiers charged by court martial with murder of Captain George Lancelotti, of the British army, in Germany last year, has been recommended by Secretary Weeks. The men, James A. O'Dell, Roy O. Youngblood, George Van Gilder, Carl J. Bryan and Jim B. Richardson, are serving life sentence in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kan.

Italy's Unknown Soldier Buried

Rome, Nov. 4.—Italy's unknown soldier found this morning final sepulture in the Victor Emmanuel monument, "the altar of the country," exactly under the allegorical figure representing Roma. King Victor Emmanuel and the royal family were the chief mourners in the solemn ceremony, which was rendered deeply impressive by the presence of large numbers of widows, orphans, mothers and blind and mutilated men of the war.

The body was transported from the church of Santa Maria Degli Angeli in formal procession.

Twenty-eight persons have been sent to the penitentiary and one sentenced but paroled by Judge G. F. Skipworth of the Lane county circuit court since January 1. There are now 15 prisoners in the county jail.
