No New Maps For Kids Until Europe Quits Rebelling

New Castle, Pa., Nov. 19.—The city school board here is not going to take any chances. The treaty of Versailles changed things in Europe a lot but until they decide to be peaceful over there and not kick over the diplomatic traces New Castle school kids will have to worry along with their old school maps.

A request for maps for the high school was turned down the other night by the school board. The board could not see where the European situation was settled enough to permit the buying of new European maps yet. They thought the students could get along with the old ones until the boundaries are finally settled.

A requisition for a dozen sets of scales to be used in taking the weight of pupils in the city schools was also turned down, along with a requisition for a victrola and records for the high school.

Three Million Pounds of Prunes Shipped To Date

With Salem well up in the list of heavy prune shipping points, more than 3,000,000 pounds of the new crop of prunes have been shipped by the Oregon Cooperative association since the first car rolled earlier in the fall. Nearly fifty solid cars have been shipped from association warehouses in addition to numerous smaller lots. The plants have been busy filling orders.

The marketing problem of last year was one of disposing of small prunes. This year with a light crop and with the small prunes nearly all cleaned up it is not expected that difficulty will be encountered in disposing of the remainder of the crop which will be of the best quality and of large sizes.

Many growers are insistent that this year's prunes are the best which have been produced in years, some saying that they have not seen better ones in 20 years.
