

JONES OUT FOR JOB AS GOVERNOR

Former Marion County Representative Admits He May Seek Olcott's Place

Portland, Or., Nov. 21.—Confirmation of percolating rumors that Seymour Jones may be a candidate in the republican primaries for nomination as governor, was received Saturday from the best of authority. There can be no higher authority than Mr. Jones himself.

Until Mr. Jones frankly admitted that he has serious intentions, and not only intentions but a platform up his sleeve, were the rumors regarded as possessing any substantial foundation. Mr. Jones, who represented Marion county in the 1919 and 1920 sessions of the legislature, during which time he was speaker of the house, is more willing to take any of the other tentative aspirants for Governor Olcott's shoes, for he tells two planks on which he stands and gives an idea of what he plans doing if he is a candidate.

Income Tax One Plank.

"There is a probability that I may enter the field and make the run," confessed Mr. Jones, while in Portland attending the National Grange convention. "There is nothing certain about it yet, however. I will not go into the race unless I find that I can make an active campaign. There is no sense in being a candidate unless one can go to the people and offer something which the candidate believes will benefit the state. Regarding the latter I have some ideas.

"Providing I become a candidate, I will, among other things, advocate a state income tax law. Heretofore land has been bearing the burden until the point has been reached where new sources of revenue must be found, for the land owner is carrying more of load than he can bear. I am a farmer and understand the problems which confront the farmer, and I understand the farmer's views on taxation. He wants relief, and so does every other taxpayer, whether a farmer or city man.

Impost Held Square Deal.

"A state income tax should not be opposed by anyone. If a man has an income he should be glad to pay a tax on it, and if a man hasn't an income then the tax doesn't reach him. We would not tax incomes as heavily as the federal government, and our minimum income might be different from that of the government, but the idea is sound.

"I noticed in the Oregonian a week ago that the prospective candidates have been avoiding committing themselves on the 1935 fair tax until they could get a line on how the people feel. Well, you can put me down as an exception, for I am prepared right now to say where I stand. Listen—

"I am opposed to a state tax for the 1935 fair. The exposition isn't a governmental function and money for a show should not be raised by general taxation, for it establishes a bad precedent. Mark you, I do not oppose the fair, for while it will benefit Portland, it will also benefit the entire state in proportion. I would favor seeing the fair financed through an income tax, but not by a levy on the assessed valuation of the state, for that means adding to the load which the state must carry.

State Expenses Too High.

"Then, too, I believe there should be reductions in the cost of operating the state. Economies can, doubtless, be effected through abolition of some boards and commissions and consolidation of others. Taxation will be the main issue in the coming gubernatorial campaign."

Lane Growers Get 8½ Cents For Raspberries

Eugene, Ore., Nov. 21.—The pool of 112,000 pounds of this year's crop of raspberries handled for the growers of Lane county by Eugene Fruit Growers' association has just been closed, said J. O. Holt, manager of the association, today.

The price received by the growers for red raspberries is 8½ cents and for blackcaps 10½ cents, which is 2 cents higher than received by some of the other larger raspberry shippers this year, said Mr. Holt.

The Eugene growers' pool was the largest in the history of the association.

Mrs. Harold Withrow Sues for Divorce

In her complaint Mrs. Withrow states that on several occasions her husband swore at her. She asks a division of the property and alimony for the support of their one child. The couple were married in October, 1919.

Lea to Remain Fair Secretary

Reports received in Salem following a meeting of the state fair board held in Portland recently, indicate that A. H. Lea, secretary of the board will remain at the head of the fair for another year. Mr. Lea sometime ago announced that he would resign at the close of this year's fair, and his formal resignation was presented to the board at its recent meeting. Several members of the board urged Mr. Lea to continue in his present capacity, with the result that he said he would give the request consideration. It was announced today that he had decided to comply with the request of the board and stay on the job for at least another year.

James N. Glover, Former Salem Man, Dies at Spokane

James N. Glover, one time resident of Salem and city official died at his home in Spokane yesterday at the age of 84.

After crossing the plains with his father in 1849, he settled on the old Glover donation land claim about six miles east of Salem and in 1872 moved to eastern Washington and took up a "squatters right," which afterward became the site of the city of Spokane.

W. J. Glover, county road master, is a nephew of the northwest pioneer. Other nephews and nieces include Ralph Glover, Ronald C. Glover of Salem, Mrs. Harvey Taylor of Macleay, Mrs. Ellen Lambert of Dayton, George and Frank Glover of Sublimity; Mrs. Flora Hobart of Silverton; Mrs. Dolly Johnson of Marquam, Edward, Grant and Phillip Graves of Molalla.

Two Cities To Build Dams Power Plants

The proposed power project of the city of McMinnville, involving an expenditure of approximately \$250,000 in construction work, was approved by State Engineer Percy A. Copper this morning. The application of the city of McMinnville covers the construction of a reservoir on Nestucca river and Walker creek for the storage of 9500 acre feet of water and for the appropriation of such stored water together with the water from the direct flow of the stream for the development of 5807 horsepower.

This development contemplates the construction of an earth-fill dam 50 feet in height and about 250 feet in length, at an estimated cost of \$100,000, and a tunnel and pipe line about five miles in length, and power house on Panther creek, at an estimated cost of \$250,000.

The applications of the city of Myrtle Point, in Coos county, have also been approved, for the construction of the John creek reservoir for the storage of eighty acre feet of water, and for the appropriation of such stored water, together with the water in John creek, for a municipal water supply. This development contemplates the construction of a rain-

forced arched concrete dam, on John creek, 42 feet in height and 77 feet in length, on top, at an estimated cost of \$25,000, and a pipe line five and a half miles in length, at an estimated cost of \$20,000.

3rd Oregon Vets To Hold Banquet On December 10

The veterans of the old Third Oregon infantry will give their second annual dinner at 7 p. m. December 10, at the Imperial hotel at Portland, according to a letter received by Captain Tom E. Rilea, former secretary of the organization.

Two meetings of the veterans of Oregon's famous old regiment are held twice each year, August 5, the date the regiment was officially incorporated into federal service and December 11 the date it left the shores of the United States for France.

Those who are expected to attend from Salem are Colonel Geo. A. White, Colonel Carl Abrams, Major Henry Miller, Captain Tom Rilea, Captain Harry Brumbaugh, Lieutenant Allen G. Carson, Lieutenant Ernest G. Robins, Lieutenant Louis Compton and practically all of old company M, Salem, famous war unit.

Work of constructing the new highway bridge across Bulley creek, on the central Oregon highway one mile from Vale, was begun this week by the United States Bridge company of Boise.

Iron Industry Shows Decrease

Washington, Nov. 21.—The iron and steel industry has reported a decrease of 37.8 per cent in the number of workers employed in October, as compared with the same month last year, the department of labor announced today.

In a summary of the employment situation, the department reported that the iron and steel industry employed last month 11 per cent more than in October, 1920.

Six of the fourteen industries reported increased payrolls compared with the same year last year. The iron and steel industry report indicated a decrease of 67.6 per cent in October, 1920.

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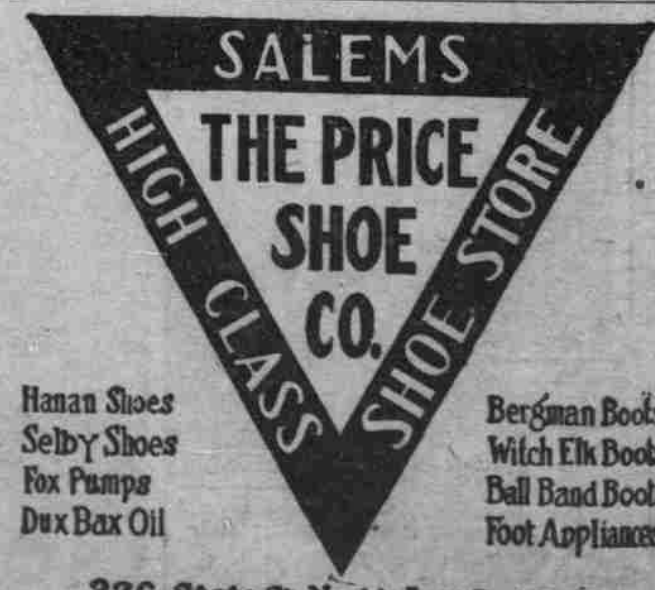
