One gives cities and towns the right to pass regulatory ordinances. Another exempts neighborhood trucks, for example that of a farmer who hauls produce to market for other farmers, from application of the measue. A third provides that the commission 'may" instead of "shall" request truck operators and the fourth removes the word "surety" from mention of bonds required and
