Eggs went up in buying price yesterday to 30 and 32 cents. There is a little uncertainty connected with the rise and the price may drop next week. Portland buyers are afraid farmers have been holding large quantities of eggs and have sent no specific quotations to Salem shippers. The highest retail price today was 35 cents.

Sugar took another rise today and is now selling for \$6.20 a sack or more. An increase was announced yesterday in the price of refiners.

Halibut has increased to 35 cents a pound, because of scarcity and because there is no competition in the salmon market.

By shopping about a bit the housewife can obtain real eastern hard wheat flour for \$2.10 a sack. This is a price equal to that of valley flour.

Some California herring was on the market for 15 cents a pound this morning.
