City Purchase of Camp Ground and Sweeper Favored

Purchase of both the city auto imp grounds and a new sweeper for the street department appear-odto be favored by seven members of the city council who last night gathered for an informal meeting in the city hall. No business was transacted at last night's session, but the two proposals will be brought before the aldermen at their next regular meeting.

A plan whereby the city would charge 50 cents per night per automobile at the grounds, was suggested by Alderman Ed Schunke, who has made a close study of the city auto camp question. Last year, it was said, approximately 5800 machines were registered at the local camp, and it is believed that fully 6000 will be here this season. At 50 cents a machine, it is thought, the city would be able to manage the grounds in a profitable manner.

The new sweeper, purchase of which is advocated both by Walter Low, street commissioner, and members of the street committee, would cost \$7500, but members of the council are convinced that, through its operation, the city could save approximately \$2000 annually.
