

PRODUCTION OF POULTRY IS NOT THOT EXCESSIVE

That there is no over production of poultry in the state at the present time was intimated by Professor Charles S. Brewster of Portland, speaking before the Marion County Realtors' association yesterday in the Marion hotel.

"There has been a remarkable increase in the production of poultry the last four years, but it has slowed down considerably within the last year, and I do not think that there need be any fear of this condition existing," said Mr. Brewster.

A committee was appointed by A. C. Bohmstedt, president of the association, composed of Eugene Grabenhorst and L. G. Hayford to get in touch with O. A. C. authorities with regard to having an experimental poultry farm in this county.

A committee of H. E. Brown, George Thomason and W. A. Copley to meet with the state tax commission which convenes here April 25 to accept suggestions for relief from high taxes.

The agitation has reached Amoy university, the government schools and other institutions.

Christian leaders and consular authorities express alarm at the extent of the movement, which is reported to be backed by communist agitators.

FEDERAL TAXES MAY BE PAID IN VICTORY NOTES

Washington, April 21—Collectors of internal revenue were authorized Tuesday by Commissioner Blair to receive at par victory notes of either the 4% per cent or 3% per cent series in coupon form in payment of income and profits taxes payable on June 15, 1922, and victory notes of the 4% per cent series, in coupon form, in payment of income and profits taxes payable September 15 and December 15, 1922.

Victory notes of the 4% per cent series will not be accepted on the payment of income and profits taxes payable September 15 or December 15, 1922, and registered victory notes will not be acceptable on any payment.

TOLEDO MAN MURDERS WIFE AND KILLS SELF

Los Angeles, Cal., April 21—W. D. Heintzelman of Toledo Ohio, Tuesday shot and fatally wounded his wife, Garnet Heintzelman, and then killed himself. Letters telling of his intentions were found on his body. The shooting occurred in a hotel room.

MUTILATED BODIES OF AGED COUPLE ARE FOUND

Springfield, Mo., April 21—The mutilated bodies of J. W. Hunt and wife, each about 72 years of age, were found at their farm home near Buffalo near here late Tuesday. The aged couple had not been seen since Thursday. Robbery is believed to have been the motive for the double murder. A span of white mules and a wagon belonging to Hunt are missing.

COLORS FOR 1923 AUTO TAGS FIXED

Oregon's 1923 license plates for motor vehicles will consist of white figures and lettering on a dark blue background. The order for the plates was placed by Secretary of State Koser Tuesday with the Irwin-Hodson Co. of Portland at a price of 14 1/2 cents per set for 130,000 sets. It is probable that an addition will be made to this original order later if prospects for an increase in the automobile and truck population of the state justifies. The price paid for the 1923 plates will be approximately 3 1/2 cents per set less than that paid for the 1922 plates.

The Portland company was also awarded the contract for the 1923 motorcycle licenses at 39 1/2 cents per set, the motor dealers' license plates at 26 1/2 cents per set and the chauffeur's badges at 12 1/2 cents each.

The Irwin-Hodson company have been making the Oregon license plates since 1915. There was only one other bidder at this time, a Los Angeles, Cal., company.

FLYERS WILL COMPLETE FLIGHT IN NEW PLANE

Lisbon, April 21—(By Associated Press.)—A new hydro-airplane will be shipped to St. Paul docks to enable the naval captains Sacadura and Coutinho to resume their trans-Atlantic flight, interrupted by the virtual destruction of their machine in landing at the rocks.

It is believed here that it will be two weeks before the airmen can resume their flight to Rio Janeiro.

Diplomatic Mail by Air
Paris, April 21—For the first time ever known diplomatic pouches will be carried by airplane during President Millerand's trip through Algeria and Morocco. They will land once in Spain and drop the pouch for the French Embassy. Thirty automobiles will make up the president's escort, and for five weeks they will visit every important point of the two French colonies.
