

Tacoma, Wash., April 27-Governor Louis F. Hart has sent a telegram to President Harding declaring that abandonment of Camp Lewis by the war department will constitute a "breach of faith that the people of the northvest will not soon forgive."

The governor, in his telegram, declared that the government had entered into a definite compact with the state of Washington and the people of Pierce county to maintain a division at Camp Lewis and that as a result of that compassed the requisite legislation for the residents of Pierce county to donate the Camp Lewis site to the

Pierce county bonded itself for \$2,000,000 to buy the site, the Some of the duplicate liberty governor informed the president, and the bonds will not be paid off for 16 years.
