There was not even standing room left last night at the Salem armory when all had taken their places to hear the oratorio "Creation," the largest thing of its kind ever presented in Salem.

The mass chorus was an impressive sight as the different sections filed in to take their places—Monmouth, Dallas, Albany and Salem.

Success Unquestioned The oratorio was the opening event of the first annual Willamette Valley May Festival, given with the intention of making the festival an annual institution of growing importance.

The work of the chorus was wonderful and should be given first mention for the precision with which that huge body of more than 400 singers responded to the direction of Dr. John R. Sites, director.

Soloist Keenly Enjoyed Mrs. Jane Burns Albert, as Gabriel, was delightful. Her voice is clear and rich and sweet and when singing with huge chorus she could be heard and enjoyed.

Orchestra Work Praised Mrs. J. S. Ianders and Charles E. Cone were well liked as Adam and Eve. Their appearance was in the third part and their numbers were harmonious and well done.
