SANITY LEAGUES COME TO SALEM; WANT WINE, BEER

F. George Walker, Vice-President of the Sanity League of America, whose professed purpose is to bring back light wines and beer to a dry populace, is in Salem registered at the Marion hotel and prepared to accept applications for membership in the league. The principal object of the league, according to its literature, is to crystallize into concerted action the "present overwhelming sentiment in favor of wines and beer and opposed to the open saloon." Literature offered by representatives of the league states that "the Volstead act, as now drawn, cannot be enforced and is making lawbreakers out of millions. It is flooding the country with spurious liquors, causing untold sickness and death. We propose to modify this law that it will reflect the will of the majority of the people and thus be enforceable without a special army of men and \$100,000,000 annually which must come out of the pockets of the taxpayers." Organizers, league men say, will be sent to every populous center of the country to call mass meetings, organize parades and otherwise work up interest preparatory to membership campaigns. Congressman Julius Kahn, of California, has drawn for the league a petition which it is claimed, will be signed by millions and presented to national lawmakers. Members in the league are assessed \$1 yearly. Considerable literature is being distributed in Salem by league members.
