An extended account of the affair and the Geer family, given in the Portland Oregonian, is given here in part:

The Geer family, at least this branch of it, was founded really by the coming to Oregon in 1842 of Joseph Carey Geer, Jr., from Galesburg, Ill. He was followed with his wife and two children. They were the sons of Joseph Carey Geer, who was born in Connecticut in 1795. He and his family moved to Ohio in 1818, and removed from there to Galesburg, Ill., in 1840.

It is well known that T. T. Geer has been not only an active citizen of Oregon for more than 35 years, but he has served Oregon as governor, and has therefore cut a big figure in Oregon history, for men are not promoted to that high office without certain mental qualifications and without passing through a grind in lower positions.


