

## RAILROAD STRIKE CALLED FOR SATURDAY

### COMMITTEE TO DECIDE ON REWARD SPLIT

### Disinterested Salem People Asked to Determine Distribution of Money For Pervert.

A committee of disinterested persons, including John McNary, president of the Salem Rotary club; Roy Shields, president of the Salem Kiwanis club; J. C. Perry, president of the Salem Commercial club; Mrs. LaMoine Clark, president of the Salem Woman's club, and C. W. Brandt, president of the Central Trades and Labor Council of Salem, will be asked to determine the disposition to be made of the reward money offered for "information leading to the arrest and conviction" of C. A. Sloat, moral pervert who attacked two little Salem girls on the morning of March 5.

### Claimants Must Agree

The decision is conditioned upon the agreement of those claiming the reward to agree to abide by the decision of such a disinterested committee. Should any of the claimants for the reward money refuse to agree to abide by the decision of the committee the reward money, totaling \$1000, will be pooled and necessary steps taken to have the conflicting claims determined in the circuit court.

### Klan Not Represented

The Ku Klux Klan which announced the offer of a reward of \$200 for the capture of the pervert did not have a representative at the meeting, although invited to do so through the press, nor has any trace of the Klan money been seen.

### Committee Uninstructed

The claims of these persons were all made in writing with supporting arguments, and will be submitted to the committee which is to determine the distribution of the reward. The exact time of the committee meeting has not been determined.

### DIVIDEND CHECKS OF DEFUNCT BANK READY

Dividend checks for 5 per cent of the total deposits in the defunct Bank of Jacksonville are now being prepared by the state banking department for distribution among the depositors of the institution, according to F. C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks. This is the first dividend to be declared since the bank was closed in August, 1920, and Bramwell states that he does not expect the total saved to the depositors out of the wrecked bank will exceed 10 per cent. Checks in the first dividend will aggregate approximately \$12,000 out of a total of \$250,000 in deposits.
