WARD'S SISTER IGNORANT OF BLACKMAIL.

## D. & S. L. EXCUSED FROM RATE CUTS

Washington, July 1.—The Denver and Salt Lake railroad was excused by the interstate commerce commission today from the necessity of putting into effect on its lines the ten per cent general cut in freight rates which all other railroads in the United States made effective today.

Receivers of the line, the commission ruling indicated, found it impossible to reduce the revenues to the extent which the ten per cent cut demanded and in addition its line is now temporarily out of operation by reason of a tunnel fire and may not be put into use before August 1.

Preliminary to a final determination of the road's petition to maintain the higher rates, Commissioner Hall will hold a hearing in Denver July 21.

So far as could be ascertained, the Denver and Salt Lake was the only common carrier which did not have the ten per cent reduction in effect today as ordered by the commission in the general rate case last month.

### URGE RATIFICATION OF CHINESE TREATIES

Tokio, July 1.—(By the Associated Press)—The privy council today recommended to the prince regent ratification of the treaties relating to China adopted at the Washington arms conference.

Viscount Ito, reporting for the committee to which the privy council had referred the matter, said the resolution proposing discontinuance of foreign postoffices in China within a year had caught a heated discussion among members of the committee. Some commitment, holding that this provision involved considerable disadvantage to Japan, desired to add reservations. He explained, however, that the committee wished to respect the spirit of the Washington conference and recommended unreserved ratification.
