

VETERANS SEEK INVESTIGATION OF FEDERAL BUREAU

San Francisco, Cal., July 1.—Resolutions calling for an investigation of the United States veterans' bureau by a committee of three from the disabled American veterans of the world war, and asking President Harding to appoint a similar investigating committee, were adopted by the disabled American veterans convention here Friday.

San Francisco, Cal., July 1.—Plans for absorbing into the industries of the country the disabled veterans who have been rehabilitated through vocational training, featured the convention of the disabled American veterans of the world war, according to statements of its leaders before the convention went into its final session here Friday.

National Commander Robert S. Marx described the plans revealed to the convention by the United States veterans bureau as a tremendous step forward.

These include the establishment within thirty days of employment units in all of the 14 districts into which the veteran bureau work for the country has been divided. These units are to provide employment for the rehabilitated veterans.

Another feature of the plan is a conference of government officials leaders in the disabled veterans organization and industrial leaders in Washington soon to work out vocational objectives for the service men now being trained.
