## RESISTANCE WEAKENING

Bombardment of Positions By Free State Troops Brings Feeble Response Says Report.

Dublin, July 5-(By Associated Press.) - Bombardments of the uildings occupied by the repubicans remaining in their Sackrille street stronghold was reumed at one o'clock this afteron after a few hours lull. The Hammam hotel, which has been preading to adjoining buildings on the south. Shortly after the fire was observed in the hotel what appeared to be a white flag was hung out, but when troops and firemen approached the building they were fired at and the supposed flag was withdrawn.
