## Mr. Fanning Will Come Here Again

The promise of a return concert by Cecil Fanning, eminent baritone, who sang in Salem before last with the Apollo club, is promised by Mrs. W. Everett Anderson, of the Salem Musical bureau. Mr. Fanning is at present in England, where he is having tremendous success in concert work. Writing to Mrs. Anderson concerning these musicals, H. B. Turpin, his accompanist, says: "At our fourth and last recital of the season in London, our audience packed Wigmore hall, and gave Mr. Fanning the greatest ovation I have ever seen any singer receive. He was recalled twenty one times, sang six encores and at the end the audience stood and cheered."

The Musical Courier for June, bears out Mr. Turpin's statement, in one item saying: "In spite of the terrific heat wave which struck London at the time scheduled for the first recitals, this American baritone attracted large audiences, including many of the best known musicians of London. His audiences have been most demonstrative in their applause and scenes of wild enthusiasm have become almost a matter of course at Fanning's recitals." "Following the London concerts, Mr. Fanning will spend the summer traveling through Europe, and will return to America in January, 1923, to begin the concert tour arranged for him here."

## Shower Is Given On Wednesday

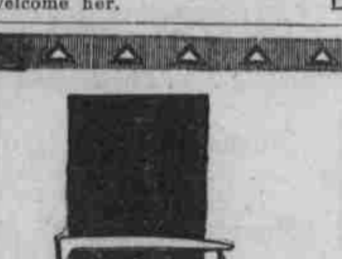
