

### WOODBURN TO PAVE STREETS WITHIN LIMITS

Woodburn, Or., July 21.—Preparations are being made for more improvement of streets in Woodburn. Harrison, Montgomery, Hardcastle, East Lincoln and Young streets are to be paved. In time there will not be an unpaved street in this city and yet there are found a few who claim that Woodburn is not progressive and with no spirited citizens. There is here one of the finest and best equipped high school buildings in the state. The taxes are of course high, but what is about \$5 more on a \$1000 valuation compared with the great benefits derived.

**Berry Situation.**  
The berry situation is not the best in the world, yet the growers will pull out all right and gain considerable experience, which will teach them that there is money in loganberries but the canners must pay more next season so as to permit the growers to offer not less than two cents per pound to pickers. So long as the price to pickers is one cent and a half-cent bonus there will be a scarcity of the crop will remain unpicked. Canners have doubtless perceived by this time how loganberry conditions can be improved and brokers will also doubtless be convinced. This inducement for next season must be held out now or the logan acreage will be materially reduced.

One logan grower has been presented with tickets showing that a picker had gathered 2200 pounds of loganberries in four days and is wondering how it could have been possible. He will probably learn that the picker had been picking from his store of tickets more than he had been picking berries and had a punch of his own.

**Church Camp Meeting.**  
The annual Church of God campmeeting started here yesterday. Campers are arriving from all over the northwest and there will be between 200 and 300 campers and a large number of prominent ministers, evangelists and missionaries from foreign lands. An intensely interesting recital of his experiences in the interior of Africa will be given by Missionary H. C. Kramer Sunday next at 2 p. m. The campmeeting will close July 30.

The 16th annual reunion of the Rolofson clan was held at the home of Barton Jack on Butte creek July 16. The attendance was large and the following officers were chosen for the coming year: Mrs. M. I. Henshaw, Seaside, honorary president; James J. Hall, Woodburn, acting president; Mary A. Hall, Salem, secretary-treasurer. The clan will meet at Champoug next year.

**Cucumbers Delivered.**  
Growers are beginning to deliver cucumbers to the California Packing company at the receiving station. The company has contracted for about a hundred acres in the territory tributary to this city.

Considerable money is being placed in circulation here in addition to what is handed berry growers. The Graves Cannery company is paying out \$2500 weekly to employes and about \$200 to truck haulers; the Oregon Packing company receiving station is paying employes \$150 and trucks \$200 weekly, and the Willamette Valley Canneries \$1550 a week for labor and \$50 to trucks.

### NEW FIRE FIGHTERS SENT SPOKANE FIRES

Spokane, Wash., July 21.—New fire fighters have been sent to the Marble creek forest east of St. Maries to replace 87 men who "walked out" there Tuesday night according to a report received from County Fire Warden Ross at St. Maries, Idaho. The 5000-acre fire sector is being fairly well controlled Mr. Ross said.

It was said the fire fighters "went on strike" Tuesday because of a disagreement over wages and working hours. The Marble creek fire is considered the largest in the district since 1918.

### QUARRY WORKER AT SILVERTON BLOWN UP

Silverton, Or., July 21.—Maimed and bleeding from wounds received from a blast of dynamite, Peter Johnson of Marquam was brought to the Silverton hospital Tuesday morning in a serious condition. Mr. Johnson was employed at a rock quarry north of Marquam. A charge had been placed and set for shooting but failed to explode. Mr. Johnson upon returning noticed the stick of dynamite and stooped over to pick it up just as the explosion occurred. Flesh was blown from one leg and his hands and arms were badly mangled. The attending physicians are doing every thing possible to save the man's life and also his hands and leg. Mr. Johnson is 67 years old and is a bachelor.

### MORE BUILDING FOR SILVERTON

Silverton, Or., July 21.—Plans are already made and work is to start at once in building a second story to the Wrightman & Uproff building on Water street, now occupied by the Lawrey dray line, according to a statement made Tuesday morning by Dr. Wrightman. It is also the intention of Wrightman & Uproff to build another garage on the vacant lot adjoining their present building on the north. The present garage building is to be made over into store rooms.

The new standard service station at the corner of Water and Oak streets will be finished and ready for service to the public by August 1. D. Worden and C. Hilliard Smith, are the proprietors. The building which was erected by M. B. Herdickson is very attractive, being built almost entirely of cement and brick. Two standard oil tanks will be in use. Besides carrying a complete line of oils and greases the company will also be agents for the Mac Dry battery. One room of the building will be occupied by Townley's tire shop.

### FORTY MILLION GOLD SENT U. S. BY BRITISH

New York, July 21.—Gold bars valued at approximately \$2,500,000 consigned to J. P. Morgan & company for the account of the British government arrived here today on the steamship Homeric. This makes a total of more than \$40,000,000 in gold received from the British treasury in the last three weeks. The proceeds from its sale presumably to be used as part payment of the \$125,000,000 interest due to the British war debt to the United States in October.

### What's New on the Market

A price of five cents a bunch for fresh beets, carrots and onions will be made by some stores tomorrow. This is due largely to one or two white producers who have managed to undersell the Oriental gardeners who have been maintaining their war-time prices on vegetables sold to the retailer.

With prices of \$1.35 to \$2.10 according to grades for a 27-pound lug of apricots, the canning season on this fruit is drawing to a close and next week will see the best gone. Housewives had better take advantage of the low prices tomorrow for their supply.

Poultry prices here changed but slightly today in spite of the reduction in Portland. Light hens were quoted here at 13 cents, heavy hens 18 and broilers from 18 to 23. There was no change in retail price.

Omaha, Neb., July 21.—Temporary injunctions were issued today in favor of the Union Pacific and Burlington railroads against striking shovemen by Federal Judge Woodrough. Federal restraining orders, returnable July

28, were issued by Judge Woodrough to the Northwestern & Missouri Pacific railroads. The strikers in all cases are restrained from interfering with rail traffic and picketing limited.
