

HOP PICKING IN FULL BLAST BY SEPTEMBER 1

Dallas, Or., Aug. 26.—One of Polk county's principal industries—hop picking—will be on in full force by Friday, September 1, and from then on until the end of the season things will be humming, especially in the vicinity of Independence, which is the hop center of the county.

On Friday the H. Clemens Hort company, C. A. McLaughlin, D. P. McCarthy and a number of others are planning to start operations on the cluster hops. Last week the Wigrich ranch started picking what is known as fuggles with a five section crew and by this time have finished with the early hops. The picking of the clusters will start with a greatly increased force. A number of the growers started picking Monday. In fact the harvest might be said to be on in real earnest right now. The season is opening a few days earlier than ordinarily, but the hops appear to be in good condition for harvesting.

Yield Is Heavier.

The yield at the big Wigrich ranch is said to be heavier than that of last year and a heavy increase in the late hops is looked for.

Virgil DeCoster had a most creditable showing of the early hops. Picking at his yard has been completed. From 27 acres his yield was in the neighborhood of 1900 pounds to the acre. This is regarded as an exceptionally good showing for fuggles. The picking of early hops has also been finished at the yards of the J. R. Cooper estate and Henry Ruch.

Crowding Independence.

Hop pickers are beginning to crowd into Independence and before the season closes it is estimated that there will be at least 5000 of them in that vicinity. These pickers are being located on arrival, but the big crowds will all be in by this week.

In the eastern end of Dallas is located the yard of Ike Yonkum, who will start picking the first of the month. He will employ about 40 pickers and his season will last about 12 days. On finishing with his own hops he will pick for the John Foster yard near Dallas on the Fall City road.

CAPITALISTS VISIT NEW LUMBER TOWN AND INSPECT TIMBER

Dallas, Or., Aug. 26.—Mr. Funk, who has been staying at the headquarters camp near New Grand Ronde for some time, returned from Portland and was accompanied by Norman Stines, W. J. Landerback and Chauncey McCormick of Chicago, Ill., Ellis Bragg and C. H. Davis of Vancouver, B. C., and Emery Olmstead of Portland. Others in the party were Clarence Olmstead, H. M. Johnston and D. Landerback.

The gentlemen from Chicago are interested in the Miami corporation, Davis and Bragg represent holders of timber interests in Oregon, Washington and British Columbia. Mr. Olmstead is president of the Northwestern National bank of Portland, also a stockholder in the New Grand Ronde bank, as is also Mr. McCormick.

The party spent several days in the vicinity of New Grand Ronde, giving that new town a careful inspection, visiting at the logging camps and acquainting themselves with the developments that have so far been made. Their visit at this time is judged significant as it will undoubtedly tend toward further expansion and improvements.

DAUGHTERS PLACE MEMORIAL IN PARK

The Daughters of the American Revolution of Salem placed a large boulder in Wilson park opposite Waller hall yesterday to mark the old pioneer trail through Salem and to honor those responsible for the founding of Oregon. The work of moving the boulder from its original resting place in the park was in charge of J. C. Jones. It is estimated that the monument weighs approximately three tons.

According to the members of the local Chemeketa chapter of the D. A. R., services dedicating and placing a bronze tablet on the boulder will be held early in October. A similar historical landmark was placed on the trail between Ashland and Medford a year ago by the Ashland and Medford chapters of the organization.

PROVINCIAL STORES TO HANDLE ALL THE BEER

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 26.—Brewers in British Columbia can no longer sell their product through agents but must distribute it through the liquor stores of the provincial government, under a ruling by Attorney General Manson. He said the beer was moving so fast out of the warehouses of brewery agents as to prove it was being illegally distributed.

Jazz Music Makes Cows Give More Milk - Says Band Manager

Shasta Monica, Cal., Aug. 26.—Jazz music makes cows give more and better milk, according to Walter G. Brooks, business manager of a brass band maintained by employees of a dairy company here.

Brooks declared that since 1921, when the band was organized, the cows have broken all records for giving milk.

"The more proficient we became and the more harmony and pep we put into our selections, the more the milk production increased," Brooks declared.
