G. A. R. TO MEET IN DES MOINES SUNDAY NEXT

Des Moines, Iowa, Sept. 21—Smaller than ever, but still the event of the year to thousands of the passing generation who watched the war of the rebellion come and go, the 56th annual encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic will open in Des Moines Sunday, September 24. Only 15,000 veterans of the Grand Army are expected to be able to attend this year's encampment.

Nine auxiliary conventions and sixteen separate reunions are expected to bring a total of approximately 75,000 patriots to Iowa's capital city during the week of the encampment.

Approximately two thousand colored veterans are expected here to hold their first reunion at this year's gathering. Shiloh, Vicksburg and Gettysburg survivors will gather from all parts of the country to march in the 56th annual parade and to attend this year's camp fire ceremonies.

The encampment program opens Sunday with patriotic services in all Des Moines churches. Civil War veterans will occupy many of the pulpits and G. A. R. drum corps will furnish the music.

On Monday the encampment opens semi-officially. Tuesday, is to be Reception and Reunion Day with a garden party in the afternoon for all visiting women and the Commander-in-Chief's reception on the state house grounds in the evening concluding with a great patriotic fireworks demonstration and musical program by 25,000 Des Moines school children at night.

The parade and camp fire will take place Wednesday, veterans of the Grand Army, led by eight bands and 25 drum corps, passing in review before the Commander-in-Chief, Lewis S. Pilcher. Hanford McNider, commander of the American Legion, will be the principal speaker at the camp fire ceremonies Wednesday night.

Thursday and Friday will be occupied with business sessions, election and installation of officers.

H. Y. CLUBS OF COUNTY MEET

County committeemen and representatives of H-Y clubs in the various towns of Marion county gathered in Salem Wednesday evening for the first session of the county committee of the Marion county Y. M. C. A. since the summer vacation period.

Reports on the activities of the organizations in the various towns in which the county association is operating were presented and plans made for the work of the year ahead.

On invitation of O. V. White of Stayton the county committee decided to hold the annual convention of the association in that city some time in October, the exact date being left to the decision of the local committee which will also arrange the program details.

Plans were also set afoot for the annual H-Y conference to be held in Silverton, also some time in October, a date to be set later.

The report of the treasurer showed the funds of the county association in splendid shape with highly encouraging prospects for another year's successful work in this county.

RUSH TO ESCAPE TARIFF CHARGES

New York, Sept. 21.—The race of customs brokers to withdraw merchandise from government warehouses before the new tariff rates become effective at midnight, became faster today.

Owners of large consignments of goods now in transit joined the race on the last day, adding to the hundreds of brokers besieging the customs house with inquiries for manifests of vessels due or a few hours overdue.

The progress toward port of one vessel bearing a cargo of almonds was being reported hourly to its owners by wireless. The anxiety over the vessel was rounded by the fact that the duty on almonds will jump from four to fourteen cents a pound.

It approved by the voters at the November election, a new city building in which the fire department, city jail and city officers will be housed, will be built at Albany next spring at a cost of \$20,000.

FRESHMEN ENTERTAIN IN UNIVERSITY FUNCTION

The first entertainment for the members of the freshman class at Willamette university was held last night in the parlors of the Leslie Methodist church. Practically the whole freshman class, numbering close to 185, was present.

The entertainment last night is the first of a series planned by the Epworth leaguers of the city for the new members of the university in order that each may become acquainted with each other and the church. It is understood that the next get together will be tomorrow night with the men leaguers of the First Methodist church being the hosts. The Jason Lee Epworth league will entertain the following week, it is planned.

Last night's program consisted of a number of games, readings and singing, after which refreshments were served. Those on the committee were: George Moorehead, Everett Lisle, Laura Pemberton, Veda Rhoten and Laura Hoyt.

What's New on the Market

New York Counts, an eastern oyster, are now on the market. They are selling at 75 cents per pint. Salem is fortunate in receiving these oysters direct from the oyster beds. Many places the oysters have to pass through the hands of jobbers before they reach the market and as a result are water bloated. The Counts are an extremely large oyster, very suitable for frying. The Olympia oysters, from Olympia, Wash., are a much smaller oyster more suitable for soup, have been on the market for some time. They are selling at 90 cents per pint.

Several of the stores are now selling tomatoes at 75 cents per box. For some time the price has been \$1 per box.

The price of lemons has advanced from 50 cents per dozen to 60 cents per dozen.

The price of eggs followed the raise in the wholesale quotation yesterday. The retail price ranges from 39 cents to 45 cents per dozen.

HYLAN STILL DEMANDS HEARST'S NOMINATION

New York, Sept. 21.—When Mayor Hylan was asked today if the defeat of delegates favorable to William R. Hearst meant the defeat of the publisher for the gubernatorial nomination, he said "no."

There were no Hearst delegates running in any county in the state," he said. "There were no authorized Hearst delegates contesting with delegates for any candidate in any county in the state. The corporation press has spread the false impression that such a contest was being waged in Erie and one or two other counties, although knowing that such a contest was not being made. The determination whether Mr. Hearst should be a candidate has been purposely kept aloof from local contests relating to local leaderships.

"The decision as to whether Mr. Hearst should be a candidate following such a course can now be had from the delegates after due consideration.

"The delegates are for the most part, if not altogether unpledged."

RUMOR OF PRISON ESCAPES GROUNDLESS

Press reports to the effect that Ed Channing, an inmate of the state prison here, had unceremoniously severed his connection with that penal institution thus breaking the long record of the prison (or no escapes, are branded as absolutely false and without foundation in fact by Deputy Warden Jolley this morning.

"Just tell the world that Channing is still among those present and accounted for in spite of the unfounded report that he had made his escape from the prison," Jolley said this morning. "Our record of more than a year without an escape still stands," he continued, knocking on wood the while to ward off any bad luck that might be lurking in the vicinity.

The last escape from the prison occurred on September 8, 1921.

SULTAN PRESIDES OVER TURKISH CROWN COUNCIL

Constantinople, Sept. 21.—(By Associated Press.)—An important crown council, presided over by the sultan, was held last night at which the position of the caliph was discussed in the event the nationalists forcibly take Constantinople. The heir apparent and other principal personages were present and measures for the protection of the sultan were decided upon.

It is learned that there is no truth in the reports that the Ankara government had decreed the abdication of the sultan.

The run of silver dollars off the mouth of the Columbia river is said to be the largest in many years, a number of boats having come into Astoria with as high as 1500 pounds each.

POST OFFICE AT FAIR GROUNDS

Arrangements have been definitely settled whereby a mail station will be maintained at the state fair grounds, Arthur E. Gibbard, assistant postmaster, is to have personal charge. A letter sent by Mr. Gibbard to A. H. Lea, secretary of the fair board, reads as follows:

"We plan to open the state fair station on Sunday, the 24th, and close on Monday, October 1. Authority to exchange mails with trains 15, 13 and 12 was received this morning. This service will be supplemented by auto service four times a day and will be, we believe, adequate. The postmaster has requested that I take personal charge and see that the best of service is maintained. This station will handle all classes of mail including registered, insured and special delivery and C. O. D. and persons who intend to have their mail at this station should address it just 'State Fair Station.' Any publicity you might give this matter would probably be of assistance to the exhibitors and patrons of the fair and any suggestions you may have to offer will be gladly received."

WALDPOR ACCUSES SPRUCE CORPORATION

The Port of Alsea, the Waldport Community association and H. L. Wagon have filed with the public service commission a complaint charging that the Pacific Spruce corporation has been operating a common carrier railroad between South Beach and Waldport in Lincoln county without complying with the public utilities law. The company, the complaint sets out, has failed to file its schedules of mission, has torn up and abandoned a part of its lines without the consent of the commission and is giving a service that is entirely inadequate and discriminatory.

The commission explains that the company has never made any attempt to comply with the utilities act as a common carrier.

\$786,329 DISTRIBUTED AUTO LICENSE FUND

A total of \$786,329.01 in automobile registration fees has been distributed among the various counties of the state during the year ending September 15, according to a statement prepared by Secretary of State Koser. This represents one-fourth of the total net receipts of the department for the year, the distribution being made on a basis of each county's contribution to the fund.

A total of \$3,291,805.34 was collected by the registration department for the year of which amount \$146,239.31 was consumed in administrative expense. Three-fourths of the net receipts, or \$2,458,957.02 was credited to the state highway department.

SMITH NOMINATED MINISTER TO ALBANIA

Washington, Sept. 21.—Ulysses Grant Smith of Pennsylvania, until recently American commissioner and charge d'affaires of the American legation in Hungary, was nominated today by President Harding to be minister to the newly recognized government of Albania. He has been in the diplomatic service since 1903.
