Turks Delay Reply to Final Ultimatum Given by Allies

Social Life and Neighborhood Spirit of Co-operation and Fraternity Resulting from Close Association and Old Friendships

Give Way Before Vicious Propaganda of Religious Bigotry, Suspicion and Hate and are Killed By Klan Poison

Editor's Note—Following is the second of a series of articles dealing with the history and growth of the Ku Klux Klan in Oregon, written by a member of The Capital Journal staff from personal observation and investigation in an extended tour of the state.

Wherever the Ku Klux Klan has invaded an Oregon community the social, financial and political losses are incalculable. Especially does this apply to the social demoralization.

Neighborhood Clubs Wrecked. Everywhere I found tales of neighborhood clubs, little groups of congenial people who, never giving a thought to the religious bias of the other members, had met together in the homes of one member or another at more or less regular intervals, for years and years in some cases, in a general spirit of good-fellowship.

INDIAN'S TRIAL FOR MURDER AT DALLAS

Jury is Sworn in Just Before Noon Adjournment in Case Against Warren for Murder.

Dallas, Or., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—The jury in the trial of Phillip Warren, Indian, accused of the murder of John Price and Grover Todd, federal prohibition enforcement officers, at the town of new Grand Ronde, was completed and sworn in just before Judge Harry H. Belt adjourned court for the noon recess here today.

FREE TO USE BONUS MONEY AS DESIRED

Supreme Court Holds That Ex-Service Men Can Spend Loan Secured as They Want.

German Mark Down Again

CONCESSIONS TO TURKS AT AN END NOW

Allies Await Action by Angora Government Upon Armistice Contentions; Ready for War

Constantinople, Oct. 10.—(By Associated Press.)—When the British cabinet council adjourned at 6:30 this evening, the government was still without news as to whether the Turkish nationalist authorities at Angora had accepted the armistice convention presented by the allies at Mudania.

London, Oct. 10.—(By Associated Press.)—The signing of the protocol armistice at Mudania is expected to take place at 5 o'clock this afternoon, according to an announcement by the Havas Agency, the semi-official French news organization.

London, Oct. 10.—(By Associated Press.)—The question of peace in the Near East now rests with the Turkish nationalist assembly at Angora, which has before it the armistice conditions laid down by the allied powers.

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
