

# POLK COUNTY TEACHERS MEET NOVEMBER 1-3

Dallas, Or., Oct. 21.—The Polk county teachers' institute will be held at the Dallas high school in Dallas on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, November 1, 2 and 3.

Many prominent speakers will attend, one of whom is Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill of Salem, who will give one general assembly address, and in section meetings will explain the revised course of study and also interest the teachers in teaching Oregon history and agriculture. Frank Brumbaugh, head of the department of psychology of the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis, will speak upon the following subjects: "Political Principles Employed in School Life," "Motivation," "Art and Knowledge in Examination," "How to Teach Reasoning." Ira Richardson from the University of Oregon, will give talks upon the following: "Some Professional Facts and Their Implications," "Unsolved Problems in Education," "What Is the Next Step in Secondary Education?" and "A New Day for Rural Schools." Mrs. W. A. Barnum, from the Oregon Normal school, will have charge of the advanced department in the division; Miss Kate Houx, of the same institution of learning, will have charge of the intermediate department in the grade school, while Miss Clayton Burrow will have charge of the primary department on the grade division. Mrs. F. M. Parrish will be in charge of the music department and will present several interesting lessons as well as entertaining the teachers with her music. Miss L. Hazel Williams, the Palmer penman expert of Oregon, will present penmanship at the institute.

Josiah Wills, county superintendent of schools, has appointed the following persons on the resolution committee: R. R. Turner, city superintendent of Dallas schools, as chairman; Mrs. J. H. Collins of Independence, E. K. Barnes of Grand Ronde, Miss Ruth Richards of Rickreall, J. W. L. Kaufman of Falls City; on the athletic committee has been appointed L. L. Gooding of Mouth, chairman; P. W. Campbell of Falls City, O. D. Byers of Independence, J. C. Riney of Dallas, Wiley W. Knights of Perrydale, Charlotte Davenport of Ballston, and F. M. Mitchell of Rickreall.

During the time of the annual institute every school in the county must be closed and every teacher must attend the institute at least 16 hours.

The teachers of Dallas will give a reception to the teachers of Polk county at the Dallas high school on Wednesday evening, November 1, at 8 o'clock. Every teacher is cordially invited to attend this reception.
