

SCHOOL BILL HELPS CATHOLICS STATES FLEGEL

Portland, Oct. 31.—At a big mass meeting last night at Jefferson high school, A. F. Flegel, well known lawyer and prominent as a Methodist and a Mason, speaking under the auspices of the protestant and non-sectarian committee which is opposing the public school bill, made the following very startling statement:

"The proposed so called compulsory school bill will do and is doing more to promote the advance of catholicism than anything that has taken place in this country in a century.

"It is a universal fact of history that the blood of the martyr is the seed of the church. Without exception, any agitation against any group of people on the ground of their religious belief has only served to strengthen and extend that group.

"A few days ago a Catholic priest in eastern Oregon said to a protestant friend of mine, 'Do you know, a very remarkable thing is taking place? For many years I have been disturbed because our people seem to be getting away from the church. I presume that you protestants have had a similar experience; but since this so called compulsory school bill has been proposed, our people have rallied to the church with an intensity and unanimity that I have never known in all my experience?' And today, here in Portland, the Catholic churches are crowded as they have never been in the history of the state.

"Moreover, this so called public school bill is bringing protestants by the thousands to a feeling of intense sympathy for Catholics, simply because they feel they are not getting a square deal.

"Had the sponsors of this bill lain awake nights trying to devise ways and means for promoting the very thing they seek to check, they could not have served catholicism more efficiently.

"If this were not so tragic in the bitterness it has aroused, it would be very funny to think of these gentlemen, and others who are assisting them, becoming the greatest missionaries that the Catholic church has possessed in a hundred years."

DOZEN DEAD AS RESULT OF ATTACK BY FASCISTI BANDS

Rome, Oct. 31.—Twelve persons were reported dead today as the result of attacks yesterday in which fascisti were involved.

Snipers fired from windows while the fascisti from Abruzzi were crossing a workmen's quarter through which they were entering the city. Four fascisti fell dead. Reinforcements were sought and the police soon occupied the whole zone, which is the same one in which fascisti were attacked last May 24, during a celebration of the anniversary of Italy's entrance into the war.

The other fatalities reported today, eight in number, resulted from a clash yesterday afternoon between fascisti and communists in the Sibirino quarter.

A band of Ancona fascisti led by Casaro Rossi broke into the home of Deputy Mingrino, commander of the communist red guards last night. They seized all the documents they could find, sequestered forty hand grenades and threw the furniture into the street and set it on fire.

CELEBRATED JESUIT DEAD AT LONDON

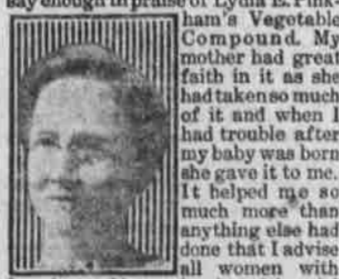
London, Oct. 31.—(By Associated Press) — Father Bernard Vaughan, one of the most prominent Jesuit priests in the world and a brother of the late Cardinal Vaughan, died here today. Several years ago he toured through the United States and parts of Canada and Alaska and later lectured in Japan, where he addressed the house of peers.

Father Vaughan became ill two or three months ago at Sheffield but recovered sufficiently to be removed to the Jesuit college at Putney. There he was able to get about in a rolling chair.

He was bedridden only three days before the end came. His brothers in the Society of Jesus were around his bedside when he died.
