

LEGAL TO WRITE ANDY GUMPS NAME ON BALLOT

Tillamook, Or., Nov. 7.—As District Attorney Goynes had given his opinion that writing the name of Andy Gump on the ballot would invalidate the entire ticket and had prepared to instruct election boards to that effect, the following telegram was sent to Mr. Goynes by State Attorney General Van Winkle:

"Request by election boards to advise whether writing Andy Gump on ballot by voter would invalidate ballot. My opinion is that this is not a distinguishing mark, especially if written by several, and would not authorize rejection of the ballot so voted."

From all indications Andy Gump will poll a large number of votes in opposition to Rollie W. Watson, who received the nomination on the republican ticket for representative, but is now supporting the democratic ticket. Should Mr. Watson win in the election, his seat will be challenged when the state legislature meets.

Attorney General Van Winkle, in response to inquiries received from district attorneys of various counties in Oregon, yesterday advised them that in case the name of Andrew Gump is written on the ballots the remainder of the ballot designations must be counted.

In several counties of the state, where there are no contests for certain offices, opponents of the regular nominees have signified their intention of writing the name of Gump on the ballots.

FAIR WEATHER FOR VOTING IN MONTANA

Helena, Mont., Nov. 7.—With fair weather prevailing over the entire eastern section of the state, which republicans count on to give them an advantage in today's election by bringing out a large farmer vote, Montana went to the polls to pick a United States senator, two congressmen, several state officers and county tickets.

Last minute predictions by managers of both parties expressed confidence of victory for Carl W. Riddick, republican, and B. K. Wheeler, democrat, candidate for United States senator.

Closely pressing the senatorial contest, if not in many parts of the state overshadowing that feature of the election, is the interest in the proposed tax program of Governor Dixon which is being submitted to the voters in the form of a constitutional amendment.

CHAMBER TO HAVE OPEN FORUM TOMORROW NIGHT

Tomorrow night at 8 o'clock the regular open forum meeting of the Salem chamber of commerce will be held in the chamber's auditorium. With many additional members recently added to the rolls, Manager Bob Duncan today expressed the opinion that a large crowd will be present.

"If members have any criticism to make—any suggestions to offer—we hope they'll bring them tomorrow night," Mr. Duncan said.

WORKMAN KILLED IN HIGHWAY BLAST

Medford, Or., Nov. 7.—C. W. Drake was killed and several other workmen injured, one perhaps fatally Monday by a blast in William Von Hellen's road building operations near Prospect. The workmen failed to take their distance while the blast was being set off.

An ambulance and medical aid were sent from Medford. An unidentified workman, whose injuries were thought fatal, was brought to a hospital here. Details are meager as telephone communication with Prospect, 50 miles from here, is difficult.

OLCOTT CLOSES STATE CAMPAIGN

Dayton, Or., Nov. 7.—Governor Olcott brought his campaign for re-election to a close last night with an address to a large and enthusiastic gathering to which he promised that if retained in office he would give the people of Oregon a safe and sane government just as he has done in the past.

Walter L. Toozie, Jr., state republican chairman, accompanied the governor here and joined with Mr. Olcott in refuting the misstatements and in exposing the trickery of the Pierce campaigners. Both Mr. Toozie and Mr. Olcott presented the republican policy in a clear cut and convincing manner.

"I am proud of the part I have played in the government of this state," said the governor in concluding his address. "I have handled the money you have sent us to be used in the state administration as economically and in as business like a manner as I would have handled my own money."

"If elected, I pledge you a safe and sane government, as economical as is humanly possible, always considering the requirements of the government."

GOES TO POLLS UPON STRETCHER TO VOTE

Portland, Or., Nov. 7.—Each vote counts, no matter for whom it may be cast or for what measure it may favor or oppose, believes Thomas G. Ryan, Portland attorney, who is recovering from an operation at his home here.

Although confined to his bed, Ryan will go to the polls today to cast his vote. Arrangements have been made for a pair of stretcher bearers to carry him to the polls, two blocks away.

TURK DEMANDS CAUSE UNREST AMONG ALLIES

London, Nov. 7.—(By Associated Press)—The surprising demands which the Kemalists have made upon the allies in Constantinople since they took over the civil government there on Saturday still causes a great deal of anxiety in London. The feeling of uneasiness has been intensified by the scarcity of news from Constantinople in the last 36 hours.

All of the London newspapers treat the situation seriously and prominently. Deep suspicion of the aims of the Turkish nationalists is almost unanimous among the papers, and all of them seem worried about the safety of the non-Turkish population at the sublime port.

A Times dispatch from Constantinople dated Monday but not timed, said the situation had become most critical, and that the Ankara government apparently was determined to take advantage of the confused political situation in Great Britain and by a series of accomplished facts quickly carry out the whole nationalist program despite checks put on them by the Mudania convention.

Sails With Fine Booze.
Sydney, N. S. Nov. 6.—With about \$75,000 worth of choice liquors on board the new revenue cutter Sagamore cleared Saturday for Halifax. The liquor is the pick of the contraband seized from smuggling craft for months past and it is being taken for safe keeping to the bonded warehouse at Halifax.

OFFICIALS LEAVE WASHINGTON TO VOTE AT HOME

Washington, Nov. 7.—Elections over the country today had their reflex in Washington. In every government department there were many vacant places, several members of the cabinet and many under officials and employes having gone home to vote. The exodus this year, however, was not as great as usual as an increasing number voted by mail.

Having registered his choices in this manner, President Harding was at his office at the usual hour with a full day ahead. He has all the latest forecasts of his party lieutenants and as the day wore on received reports from the actual balloting.

Tonight he was to get the results in his study as rapidly as they could be received at the executive offices over an Associated Press wire and relayed to him over the telephone by Secretary Christian.

Four members of the president's cabinet remained in Washington. Of these Secretaries Hughes, Weeks and Wallace voted by mail. Attorney General Daugherty also voted by mail but spent today in Baltimore with Mrs. Daugherty, who is recuperating there after an operation.

Three members of the cabinet will not vote. Secretary Mellon, it was stated, was prevented from registering by pressure of public business. Secretary Hoover, now

on his way west to a meeting of the Colorado river commission at Santa Fe, N. M., is unable to reach his home state of California in time for the election, while Secretary Davis is still in the far west where he has been campaigning.

Found Dead.
Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 7.—Neighbors entering the home of Geo. R. Briery, 63, Monday found Briery and his wife dead at their breakfast. Police who investigated said the aged couple apparently had lighted two gas heaters before sitting down to their meal in the unventilated room, and had died a short time later of carbon monoxide asphyxiation.
