A very limited supply of red raspberries appeared on the market this morning. They were selling at 20 cents a box.  
A few locally grown Concord grapes were to be had at the local markets this morning. They were selling at 35 cents a basket. The grapes were small and the quality was nothing more than one could expect for this late in the season.  
The cauliflower which is now on the local markets is not of as good a quality as it was earlier in the season. All of the heads are more or less discolored and are not quite as solid. The price averages about 10 and 15 cents a head. Small quantities of ground cherries are still to be found on the local market. They are selling at 15 cents a pound.  
The hot house spinach which is now on the market is said to be exceptionally nice. The leaves are as tender as the first spring crop. It is selling at 15 cents a pound.  
Local stores are forecasting a raise in the price of most of the better grades of flour of about 20 cents a barrel. The best flour on the market is selling at about \$8.40 a barrel.  
A good eating apple which is within the reach of all is the Johnathan. Local stores are retailing this variety at \$1.50 per box. The Johnathan is also a good cooker. The Spitzenbergs, another eating apple, though not as good as the Johnathan, is selling at \$1.25 per box.
