

## POLK ROAD BOND CASE IS ARGUED BEFORE COURT

Dallas, Or., Nov. 21.—The case wherein Independence business men ask an injunction against the issuance of bonds voted for highway construction was heard before Judge George H. Bagley of Hillsboro, in Dallas last Friday.

The county court advertised \$40,000 for the bonds for sale, specifying that the amount was to be paid upon construction of the West Side Pacific highway through Polk county. It was then that the Independence men brought the court case. Saturday the evidence was heard and the case submitted. It is not expected that a decision will be filed for some weeks.

The contentions of the plaintiffs, who seek to prevent the sale of the bonds, is that the original notice of the bond election by the county court was not sufficiently specific in declaring just the road upon which the money was to be spent. The defendant, which in this case is the county, seeks to prove that by newspaper advertising and other wise, the people were given a thorough understanding of just what they were voting for, besides which the court order calling the election did specify the exact points the road leaves Yamhill county and enters Benton county.

In effect this action attacks the validity of the entire lot of \$250,000 voted in June, 1919, but does not specifically attack even the \$13,000 in bonds it is proposed to sell from the same issue to apply on the cost of the Salem-Dallas highway. This feature of the case attracted noteworthy attention and it is believed by many will be taken into consideration by the court.

Judge Martin Pipes of Portland and D. E. Fletcher of Independence appeared for the plaintiffs and J. M. Devers of Salem and J. N. Helgeson appeared for the county. Mr. Devers is attorney for the state highway commission, and in his argument attacked the good faith of the plaintiffs in bringing the action. Attorney Pipes answered this attack by pointing to the court decision not allowing the county to spend market road money on the highway.

## FINDLEY SAYS EYES OF EAST TURNED ON WEST

People in Boston and other cities in the east are talking of Oregon and want to come west, according to Dr. M. C. Findley, who has just returned from a month's visit to cities on the Atlantic coast.

"The folks back east are asking all sorts of questions about Oregon," Dr. Findley said, "and there is a strong desire to not only visit the Pacific coast, but to locate in the west."

Many well to do people in Boston know very little of the west but now they are beginning to hear of Oregon and are planning to include Oregon in their western travels, the doctor said.

Dr. Findley went east to attend the annual session of the American College of Surgeons, and was accompanied by his son, Dwight, in his travels. At Boulder, Colo., they passed through a section with one and a half foot of snow and then direct into Los Angeles where it was uncomfortably warm. Los Angeles shows more building than any city visited, and Kansas City second, he said.

This afternoon Judge G. E. Unruh, of the Salem justice court, is to hear the tale of a phonograph. Whether or not Harry Hyde of Stayton gave the instrument to Betty Morrow, also of Stayton, or whether he merely allowed her to keep it for him, will be decided by a jury.

Hyde recently brought a replevin action to recover the phonograph which, he said, he intended Miss Morrow to retain only temporarily. He says she refused to relinquish it. Miss Morrow says it was a gift.

Don Miles is attorney for Mr. Hyde and Lyle McCroskey will represent Miss Morrow.

(Continued from Page One.) people of the Mississippi and the Missouri valley, the great northwest and the Rocky Mountain states, than to the seaboard states and industrial communities inland.

"It is a common cause, with benefits commonly shared," said he.

If government aid is a fair term to apply to authorizations aggregating \$75,000,000 to promote good roads for market highways, the president added, it is equally fit to be applied to the establishment and maintenance of American market highways on the "salted seas."

## Cost \$20,000,000 Per Year

As to present government operation of the shipping board fleet, Mr. Harding said there was the unavoidable task of wiping out a fifty million dollar annual loss, and losses aggregating "many hundreds of millions" in worn out, sacrificed or scrapped shipping. He called attention that the government ships were being worn out without any provision for replacement and that a program of surrender and sacrifice and the liquidation which he declared would be inevitable, unless the proposed legislation were enacted would cost scores of billions.

The cost of the proposed legislation giving direct aid, he said, were carrying maintained at the present average, would not reach \$20,000,000 a year and the maximum direct aid of American shipping were so promoted that it carried one-half the nation's deep sea commerce would not exceed thirty millions annually.

## DEMAND FOR POSTAL BOXES EXCEEDS SUPPLY

Washington, Nov. 21.—The demand for letter boxes has become so great as a result of the recent postoffice department "no box, no mail" edict that manufacturers are unable to fill orders, the department said today, in announcing that for this reason postmasters had been authorized in their sections to postpone the effective date of the order of January 1 to not later than March 1.

The postponement is not to be construed, the department added, as a waiver of the requirement for mail receptacle or door slots, or as any relaxation of a determination to enforce the new regulations.

ficial mouthpiece of the American Unity-league, founded in Chicago last summer to combat the Klan and its theories.

As a result of these activities of the league it became known that Augustus E. Olson, one of the best known of the younger generation of south side business men, virtually had been forced out of the presidency of the Washington Park National bank.

Bank President Assailed. At that time denial was made that there had been a run on the bank as a result of the announcement that Mr. Olson was an alleged member of the Ku Klux Klan.

Investigation disclosed that several weeks ago Mr. Olson had been listed as a member of the Klan by the official organ of the anti-klan organization. Thereafter he was bitterly assailed at meetings of anti-klan organizations and reports were circulated that those not in sympathy with Klan activities had begun to withdraw their deposits in the Washington Park bank and reposit them in other banks. These withdrawals were reported to have run into the thousands of dollars, most of them being made by persons of Irish descent and by Jews.

At a meeting of the directors held a week ago last Monday it was decided that it was for the best interests of all concerned that Mr. Olson should step out, and he did, whereupon the anti-klan organization marked a big cross on its score card. Nevertheless it is only fair to Mr. Olson to state that he declared he resigned to preserve harmony in the community, adding:

"I signed a petition for membership in the Klan several months ago, but did not know that it was anything else than an ordinary fraternal order."

A short time before this incident Judge Joseph B. David, sitting in the superior court, barred klansmen from serving on juries in his court. On September 18, resuming the hearing of common law cases on his calendar, Judge David questioned prospective jurors on their sympathy with the secret organization, asserting that members of the Klan were prejudiced by their oath, and therefore ineligible as jurors.

"I will not tolerate any man serving as a juror in any case before me who is affiliated with any such organization," said Judge David. "Members of the Ku Klux Klan have confirmed opinions, and they cannot serve in this court room."

## LOCAL BUSINESS BADLY CRIPPLED BY CAR SHORTAGE

Car shortage is not only interfering with the fruit industry of the state, but is also causing great loss to the lumber industry, according to the experiences of the Spaulding Logging company.

With a capacity of shipping 15 cars a week, the Spaulding Logging company has received only 11 open cars this month, according to Oliver J. Myers, local manager. This has reduced the shipping business of the company more than 75 per cent this month. The company is also suffering from shortage on closed cars, not one car having been received this month.

The car shortage in Salem is also interfering with shipments of mill feed stuffs and alfalfa hay from eastern Oregon points to the valley, according to D. A. White & Sons.

The oats and hay crop in this part of the valley was not quite up to standard this year on account of the dry weather experienced during the summer. Hence while there is a demand for the mill feed stuffs and alfalfa hay from eastern Oregon, the car shortage has interfered greatly with this business. The eastern Oregon men are willing to sell, but the uncertainty of delivery has put a crimp into the business.

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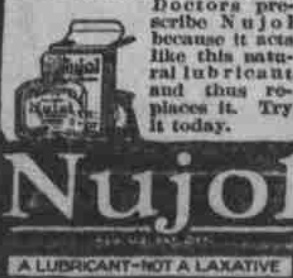
