

PEON PANTS ARE CAUSE OF LOCAL HI SCHOOL STIR

The wearing of Peon trousers by a student of the Salem high school is causing a great deal of talk in the school circles—so much, in fact, that the disruption of the associated student body is threatened.

Last Thursday Guy Albin, a senior, appeared in the halls with the trousers with the floppy legs, but not for long was he allowed to walk the halls in peace and enjoy the notoriety accompanying such an act. A number of the anti-Peon pants order, formed since the fad became so prominent in the Portland high schools, not to see the sacred laws of their organization broken, rushed Albin to the gymnasium where, it is said, he was told in no uncertain terms that unless he returned home and changed the regalia for United States attire that he would be disturbed there and dressed in an improvised pair of trousers made up largely of sack cloth. Mr. Albin chose to use discretion and went home, returning shortly in regular attire.

The student council, composed of four seniors, four juniors, and three freshmen, feeling that some judicial action should be taken met and passed a resolution stating that those choosing to wear the breeches with the big buttons would not be looked on with favor. The student body was then called into assembly on Friday to back the action of the council. The peculiar problem of having the council resign with no one willing to accept the position should the students vote against the body and flaunted by such words as "Aren't you loyal enough to support the student council," and a number of other equally challenging statements, voted to stand by the body 366 to 342.

Next Friday a number of the students, fretting under the way in which the measure was railroaded through, hope to bring the question before the students in assembly as to whether they will allow students wishing to do so to wear the Peon pants.

THEATER GOERS MOURN DEATH OF FRANK BACON

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Hundreds of thousands of America's theater-going public, rich and poor alike, actors and actresses, today mourned the death of Frank Bacon, "Lightnin' Bill," who won wide fame in the play of "Lightnin'" as preparations were being made for the memorial and funeral services scheduled for Wednesday.

The famous actor died Sunday morning, a little over one week after retiring from the role in which he had appeared almost two thousand times—a record run for any one play.

Wednesday morning the body will lie in state at the Blackstone theater, where he appeared daily as "Lightnin' Bill" for more than a year. A short eulogy will be delivered by Judge Kenesaw Mountain Landis, high commissioner of baseball and afterward funeral services will be observed in the Christian Science church, of which Mr. Bacon was a member.

MARKET FOR GRAINS GOOD SAYS DEALER

The market for all grains took good, according to D. A. White. The wheat market for the past few days has been around \$1.10 a bushel in carload lots. This is an advance of about 15 cents a bushel over the market of a few months ago, Mr. White said.

Farmers are going into fall wheat heavier than ever before, according to Mr. White. He believes this has been brought about from the fact that in his 32 years of farming in this part of the valley, he has never seen a failure in spring wheat, while the same could not be said of winter wheat.

All during the week previous to the game both schools held impromptu rallies between classes and sing the school songs. A huge red and black "Flight 'Em Salem" was placed in the halls of the local school yesterday.

The records made by the two teams seem to favor the locals. The Albany team which was defeated here 19 to 6 took the Eugene boys into camp last Saturday 13 to 0. The Corvallis team, winners over the locals 3 to 0, defeated the Eugene rivals 19 to 0.

BASKETBALL TO START TONIGHT

Tonight the Salem basketball fans will have their first opportunity to witness the game this year when the Commercial Basketball league, under the supervision of the local "Y," gets under way.

The Central Pharmacy quintet, captained by Bryd Tucker and made up principally by high school men who played last year, will meet the Bonesteel Motor company five, captained by Russell Bonesteel. The Better Yets, Mistland Bakery team, captained by Glenn Gregg, will work against the United States National bank representatives, captained by Elton Thompson. The last game will be between Anderson & Brown team, captained by Homer Hulsey, and the Hauser Bros. five, captained by William Ashby.

The first game will start promptly at 7:45 o'clock with Leslie Sparks and Coach Bohler of Willamette acting as official referees. It is planned to 15 minute halves. When the first half of the first game is finished the teams to play the second game will at once take the floor so that there will not be a dull moment throughout the evening. The teams will play every Tuesday and Friday evening. The schedule will be completed about Christmas and from the players who have shown up best in the workouts the official "Y" team, the Yellowjackets will be chosen. A fee of ten cents is being charged as admission to the three games.

DALLAS SHOP ADDS TO WORKING EQUIPMENT

Dallas, Or., Nov. 21.—A new drop pit has been constructed in the main shop of the Dallas Machine & Locomotive Works, which will greatly facilitate the locomotive work in the plant. Heretofore when making repairs on a locomotive it has been necessary to jack the engine up in the air in order to remove the wheels. All that is necessary now is to drive the engine over the pit, loosen the heavy wheels and lower them. The pit is of sufficient depth, eight feet, to allow for the easy handling of such work. The other dimensions of the pit are 10x20 feet.

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NO INCREASE IN BERRY ACREAGE IS ANTICIPATED

Bruce Cunningham, who is generally known as the king of the loganberry growers, says that there will be little planting of additional loganberry acreage in this part of the valley this coming season.

This is due, he says, to the uncertainty of prices, and the fact that the grower can hardly come out ahead unless he is assured of a market and that at six cents a pound.

Labor conditions are also uncertain and very unsatisfactory. Mr. Cunningham says, and with the prospects of even higher picking prices for another season, things do not look especially bright to the loganberry grower. At least, not enough to encourage him to put in additional acreage.

With the price last season of about four cents a pound and picking from 1 1/2 to 2 cents a pound, the grower had but little left for his labor. Hence the attitude of many interested in loganberries is to just wait and not increase the present acreage.

Mr. Cunningham now has 105 acres planted in loganberries, of which 45 acres are in bearing and 60 acres two years old.

SPECIAL SERVICES AT W. C. T. U. TO CONTINUE
